
## How Tall Was Goliath?

The Masoretic Text<sup>1</sup> of the Old Testament gives an account of Goliath's height that dramatically differs from older sources (such as the Dead Seas Scrolls,<sup>2</sup> the 4<sup>th</sup> century CE Septuagint,<sup>3</sup> or Josephus' 1<sup>st</sup> century CE history of the Jews<sup>4</sup>).

The **Masoretic Text** says Goliath was "six cubits and a span." That means he was **9 feet 9 inches** tall. A bigggg dude.

The **traditional sources** say he was "four cubits and a span." Which would make him **6 feet 9** inches tall.

Even the latter would have made Goliath seem like a giant. **Average adult male** height at the time of the Book of Judges was about **5 feet 6 inches**. <sup>5</sup>



<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> The Masoretic Text, compiled between the 7<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> centuries, is the authoritative Hebrew and Aramaic text of the Tanakh in Rabbinic Judaism. The Masoretic Text defines the books of the Jewish canon, their precise letter-text, and their pronunciation (Masorah).

Its Roman numeral, LXX, refers to the supposed seventy Jewish scholars who translated the five books of Moses into Koine Greek in early 3rd century BCE in Egypt under the sponsorship of Ptolemy II.
