From the Rector: Happy Birthday to the Church and Many More

Each week I send out birthday cards to members of our parish. The cards say how special they are to God and how much we wish them well on their special day and in the future. I add a message that wishes for them such things as love, friendship, growth, challenges, new life, surprises and God's blessings.

On the last day of May, we celebrate Pentecost, which is the feast that commemorates the church's birthday. It celebrates the day when the Holy Spirit came to the disciples as they were gathered in Jerusalem and God gave a new covenant to all believers.

Pentecost* comes from the Greek word for "fiftieth day". It was the Greek name for the Hebrew Feast of Weeks, which fell 50 days after Passover. It celebrated the calling of the Hebrews into a covenant relationship with God at Mt. Sinai. Pentecost falls 50 days after Easter, which in the gospels fell within a day of Passover.

Suppose we were going to send a birthday card to the church, to the Body of Christ on Earth—to ourselves gathered in community. The Bible tells us that we are very special to God. What would we want for us? Well, if it were my birthday, I would want all the good things God wanted for me. So I think we would want what Jesus wanted for the community that he founded—that it would grow and reach all ends of the earth. We would want the grace to preach the gospel to more people, as well as God's gracious will in inviting more people to receive it. We would want everyone possible to know about and accept the good news of God's saving grace through Jesus. We would also, it seems to me, want growth, so that we who are Christ's body would have more hands and hearts to help the many in need in the world.

I think we would also want the church to grow spiritually, as well as in numbers. We would want each person, each community and the whole Body of Christ to deepen its relationship with God in Christ through the power of the Spirit. We would want to see education programs proliferate, inspiring worship, and compassionate and caring pastoral care reaching those who are hurting.

When Bishop Johnston spoke to us during Lent, he reminded us that the church is by no means a perfect institution. It is full of human beings with human foibles. The church will have hypocrisy, arguing and people acting unpleasantly toward one another because it is full of human beings. It is God's job to sort out the purity of the church, while we work on

faithfulness, repentance and forgiveness, he said. So one of our prayers for the church on its birthday would be purity and holiness.

The bishop suggested that when we talk about the church with others, it is important to acknowledge that we have warts instead of being embarrassed by them. We try to focus on God's love for the church in spite of the problems that we have. His suggestion leads to another round of birthday prayers for the church so that it may be made more like Jesus wanted it to be.

Bishop Johnston read the prayer called "For the Church" on page 816 in the *Book of Common Prayer*. It contains many birthday petitions for the church. We pray that God will fill the church with all truth, because we see the church as the vehicle for God's truth. The Bible has given us the truth about Jesus that we need for salvation, but there are so many issues the Bible does not cover. How do we go about learning what God wants in those cases, and how do we go about expressing in ever deeper and broader ways God's love for us?

The next part of the prayer asks for peace—the peace of being rooted and settled in our faith, Bishop Johnston said, not the peace of calmness or absence of conflict. Then there are prayers for reform—that the church may be purified where it is corrupted, directed where it is in error and reformed where anything is amiss. These prayers are really different from those of average birthday cards. I don't think I have ever seen a birthday card wish that all our bad habits would be removed, that we would be nicer to others, that our sins would be forgiven and our lives made holier. But it is important for us to be honest about the church we love so much—it is always in need of God's grace to reform it because we humans are prone to error. We do not have everything right about God or about ourselves.

The rest of the prayer asks God to strengthen the church where it is right, though we might not know exactly where all those places are. We ask that it be provided for in its need. Churches everywhere are in need, of money and of people, of new life and new hope. Churches suffering persecution around the world are especially in need of our prayers and our help. The final piece of the prayer is about reuniting

the church where it is divided. We know Jesus wanted all of us in the church to be one as he and the Father are one. On the church's birthday it would be appropriate to pray for ecumenical efforts.

So, happy birthday to Christ's one, holy, Catholic and apostolic church. As we pray for one another on our birthdays and at other times, let us remember to pray for our church, the Body of Christ of which we are members, asking especially that the church may become in every way what Jesus wanted it to be, and that we be given the grace to do our part to make it so.

Reflections on Stewardship: How Much is Enough?

At the end of last month's article on stewardship, I promised that next we would discuss some questions that many churches are facing and that many, including St. John's, are not good at talking about. Are we giving enough? How much is enough? What can we do to improve our stewardship and outreach? I would like to consider these questions from two perspectives, first on an individual basis and second on a collective basis.

I am not going to pretend that it is easy for me to discuss these questions or that I have definitive answers to them. On an individual basis it is difficult to talk about these questions because giving is a very private activity. None of us really knows anyone else's situation, so we can not make any judgment of others' giving. Talking about how much one should give to St. John's is made complicated because people at St. John's give so much, in money, in time, and in dedication of their gifts to our work.

Stewardship campaigns at St. John's reflect the personality of the parish. We rely on members making up their minds about how much to give based on their own situations. That is part of who we are as a community, and I think no one, myself included, wants to change that. One result of this approach is that pledge income at St. John's regularly exceeds pledges. One of my friends goes to an Episcopal church on Capitol Hill where as part of their annual pledge drive each member is visited at home by a member of the stewardship committee to discuss their individual pledge. This church's pledge income regularly falls below the total amount pledged. The reason, I think, is obvious.

On an individual basis, there is no easy answer to the question of how much to give. At some times and places, it was easy to know how much to give. Under Mosaic Law the Israelites were to tithe. Mention of the tithe runs through Leviticus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy. But the tithe was not just a simple one-tenth to support the Levites and to do God's work—see Deuteronomy 14:22 for a description of the tithe. Today we do not have an answer to the question of how much to give that is even as simple as the tithe, however. For some Christian denominations and for some at St. John's, the tithe is the answer, but I do not think it works for all. We give to the church and we give to charities as well. For the Israelites, there was only one place to give. We have many places to give,

and we give to many, which complicates answering the question of whether we are giving enough.

I think it is clear that people pledge an amount they are comfortable with and are sure they can fulfill. This stems, at least in part, from people's unwillingness to make commitments that they may not be able to keep. As a result, St. John's pledge income regularly exceeds pledges, as noted above. People would rather pledge conservatively and exceed their pledge than pledge prospectively and not be able to fulfill that pledge. This is not bad. If I were planning St. John's budget I would be much happier knowing that pledges were made conservatively rather than worrying about whether income would match pledges.

Having run out of ways to talk around the question of how much to give, I will offer my answer. Individually, we must give as our conscience directs us. I can find no other answer that works for all.

At the same time, however, we need to ask if we are giving enough collectively. Is our giving as a parish sufficient to support the mission of St. John's? Are we able to reach out to the community around us? Are we meeting our responsibilities to support the diocese and national church? Here are some things to consider.

- Pledges to St. John's for 2009 were \$139,000, up \$8,000, or 6.1% from 2008. This is a healthy increase, but still less than the \$140,000 in pledges in 2007.
- There is no money for advertising in this year's budget. The only advertising St. John's will do this year is in the *Village View* through June, which was paid for from the 2008 budget.
- In spite of increased pledges, the 2009 budget included minimal staff salary increases, although it does cover substantially increased benefits costs.
- St. John's pledge to the diocese of Virginia was cut in 2009 from 2008's level of five percent to four percent. Just two years ago it was ten percent.

How do we respond to these issues? I think the first thing we need to do is be willing to talk about them. St. John's spent a protracted time several years ago discussing its mission and vision. Is that mission statement still one we believe in? If so, are we living that mission? If we are not, what do we need to do differently? I hope you will prayerfully consider these questions.

I hope that others from the St. John's community will take up this dialogue and offer their thoughts and reflections on stewardship and the direction of our parish.
