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Profile Committee Survey Coming Soon

The Profile Committee kicked off its work in August to prepare materials for the Diocesan Transition Ministry so that St. John's, represented by the Vestry, can identify and clarify: (1) where the church has been, (2) where it is now, and (3) where it wants to go. Only then will the committee create a picture of the person the parish seeks for the future. This committee will not conduct the actual search for a new rector, but instead is laying the groundwork for that search.

As part of this process, the committee will survey the congregation to find out parishioners' thoughts about a new rector, the current state of St. John's, and what lies ahead. There will be more information to come about the survey.

Diane Henderson Richard Henry Peter Olivere Our processional hymn on September 20, *Rock of Ages*, has been a popular hymn for more than 250 years. It was written by the Reverend Augustus Toplady (1740–1778) in 1763 and first published in *The Gospel Magazine* in 1775. This very personal hymn uses pronouns such as I and me rather than we and our, focusing on individual salvation.

Traditionally it is held that Toplady drew his inspiration from an incident in the gorge of Burrington Combe in the Mendip Hills in England. Toplady, a preacher in the nearby village of Blagdon, was traveling along the gorge when he was caught in a storm. Finding shelter in a gap in the gorge, he was struck by the title and scribbled down the initial lyrics.

The fissure that is believed to have sheltered Toplady is now marked as the "Rock of Ages," both on the rock itself and on some maps, and the title is also reflected in the name of a nearby tea shop.

There has been speculation that, though Toplady was a Calvinist, the lyrics, "Be of sin the double cure, Save from wrath, and make me pure," suggest that he agreed with the teachings of the Methodist preacher under whom he received his religious conversion, and those of his contemporary, John Wesley, who taught the "double cure," in which a sinner is saved by the atonement of Jesus and cleansed from inbred sin by the infilling of the Holy Spirit. Toplady's own published hymnal of 1776, however, contains a variant that reads, "Be of sin the double cure, Save me from its guilt and power."

In March 1776 Toplady published the hymn as part of an article in *The Gospel Magazine*, which he edited. He wrote that just as England could never pay her national debt, so man could never by his own merits satisfy the justice of God. In the middle of the article he printed for the first time the hymn *Rock* of *Ages*.

Toplady died of tuberculosis at the age of 38. As he neared the end, he proclaimed, "My heart beats every day stronger and stronger for glory. Sickness is no affliction, pain no cause, death itself no dissolution...My prayers are now all converted into praise."

Toplady wrote a number of hymns in his life, but "Rock of Ages" is by far his most famous creation.

Thomas Hastings (1784–1872) was an American composer who authored some 1,000 hymn tunes, of which the best known is "Toplady" for *Rock of Ages*. Hastings' 1822 *Dissertation on Musical Taste*, the first full musical treatise by an American author, was a notable voice in the shift in American music toward the models of German music rather than British. As "one of the first spokespersons for the cultivated tradition of American music," he emphasized the science and philosophical mission of music above the looser and more folk-based music of his predecessors.
