The Genealogy of Jesus

1.1 The book of the genealogy of Jesus Christ, the son of David, the son of Abraham 1.2 Abraham was the father of Isaac, and Isaac the father of Jacob, and Jacob the father of Judah and his brothers, 1.3 and Judah the father of Perez and Zerah by Tamar, and Perez the father of Hezron, and Hezron the father of Ram, 1.4 and Ram the father of Ammin'adab, and Ammin'adab the father of Nahshon, and Nahshon the father of Salmon, 1.5 and Salmon the father of Bo'az by Rahab, and Bo'az the father of Obed by Ruth, and Obed the father of Jesse, 1.6 and Jesse the father of David the king. And David was the father of Solomon by the wife of Uri'ah, 1.7 and Solomon the father of Rehobo'am, and Rehobo'am the father of Abi'jah, and Abi'jah the father of Asa, 1.8 and Asa the father of Jehosh'aphat, and Jehosh'aphat the father of Joram, and Joram the father of Uzzi'ah, 1.9 and Uzzi'ah the father of Jotham, and Jotham the father of Ahaz, and Ahaz the father of Hezeki'ah, 1.10 and Hezeki'ah the father of Manas'seh, and Manas'seh the father of Amos, and Amos the father of Josi'ah, 1.11 and Josi'ah the father of Jechoniah and his brothers, at the time of the deportation to Babylon. 1.12 And after the deportation to Babylon: Jechoni'ah was the father of She-al'ti-el, and She-al'ti-el the father of Zerub'babel, 1.13 and Zerub'babel the father of Abi'ud, and Abi'ud the father of Eli'akim, and Eli'akim the father of Azor, 1.14 and Azor the father of Zadok, and Zadok the father of Achim, and Achim the father of Eli'ud, 1.15 and Eli'ud the father of Elea'zar, and Elea'zar the father of Matthan, and Matthan the father of Jacob, 1.16 and Jacob the father of Joseph the husband of Mary, of whom Jesus was born, who is called Christ. 1.17 So all the generations from Abraham to David were fourteen generations, and from David to the deportation to Babylon fourteen generations, and from the deportation to Babylon to the Christ fourteen generations. 1.18 Now the birth of Jesus Christ took place in this way.

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The Genealogy of Jesus

3.23 Jesus, when he began his ministry, was about thirty years of age, being the son (as was supposed) of Joseph, the son of Heli, 3.24 the son of Matthat, the son of Levi, the son of Melchi, the son of Jan'na-i, the son of Joseph, 3.25 the son of Mattathi'as, the son of Amos, the son of Nahum, the son of Esli, the son of Nag'ga-i, 3.26 the son of Ma'ath, the son of Mattathi'as, the son of Sem'e-in, the son of Josech, the son of Joda, 3.27 the son of Jo-an'an, the son of Rhesa, the son of Zerub'babel, the son of She-al'ti-el, the son of Neri, 3.28 the son of Melchi, the son of Addi, the son of Cosam, the son of Elma'dam, the son of Er, 3.29 the son of Joshua, the son of Elie'zer, the son of Jorim, the son of Matthat, the son of Levi, 3.30 the son of Simeon, the son of Judah, the son of Joseph, the son of Jonam, the son of Eli'akim, 3.31 the son of Me'le-a, the son of Menna, the son of Mat'tatha, the son of Nathan, the son of David, 3.32 the son of Jesse, the son of Obed, the son of Bo'az, the son of Sala, the son of Nahshon, 3.33 the son of Ammin'adab, the son of Admin, the son of Arni, the son of Hezron, the son of Perez, the son of Judah, 3.34 the son of Jacob, the son of Isaac, the son of Abraham, the son of Terah, the son of Nahor, 3.35 the son of Serug, the son of Re'u, the son of Peleg, the son of Eber, the son of Shelah, 3.36 the son of Ca-i'nan, the son of Arphax'ad, the son of Shem, the son of Noah, the son of Lamech, 3.37 the son of Methuselah, the son of Enoch, the son of Jared, the son of Maha'lale-el, the son of Ca-i'nan, 3.38 the son of Enos, the son of Seth, the son of Adam, the son of God.

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When his mother Mary had been betrothed to Joseph, before they came together she was found to be with child of the Holy Spirit;

1.19 and her husband Joseph, being a just man and unwilling to put her to shame, resolved to divorce her quietly. 1.20 But as he considered this, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream, saying, "Joseph, son of David, do not fear to take Mary your wife, for that which is conceived in her is of the Holy Spirit; 1.21 she will bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." 1.22 All this took place to fulfil what the Lord had spoken by the prophet: 1.23 "Behold, a virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and his name shall be called Emmanuel" (which means, God with us). 1.24 When Joseph woke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him; he took his wife, 1.25 but knew her not until she had borne a son; and he called his name Jesus. 2.1 Now when Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in the days of Herod the king, behold, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, saying,

2.2 "Where is he who has been born king of the Jews? For we have seen his star in the East, and have come to worship him." 2.3 When Herod the king heard this, he was troubled, and all Jerusalem with him; 2.4 and assembling all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Christ was to be born. 2.5 They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it is written by the prophet: 2.6 'And you, O Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who will govern my people Israel.'" 2.7 Then Herod summoned the wise men secretly and ascertained from them what time the star appeared; 2.8 and he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child, and when you have found him bring me word, that I too may come and worship him." 2.9 When they had heard the king they went their way; and lo, the star which they had seen in the East went before them, till it came to rest over the place where the child was

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2.10 When they saw the star, they rejoiced exceedingly with great joy; 2.11 and going into the house they saw the child with Mary his mother, and they fell down and worshiped him. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts, gold and frankincense and myrrh. 2.12

And being warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they departed to their own country by another way. 2.13

Now when they had departed, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, "Rise, take the child and his mother, and flee to Egypt, and remain there till I tell you; for Herod is about to search for the child, to destroy him."

2.14 And he rose and took the child and his mother by night, and departed to Egypt, 2.15 and remained there until the death of Herod. This was to fulfil what the Lord had spoken by the prophet, "Out of Egypt have I called my son." 2.16 Then Herod, when he saw that he had been tricked by the wise men, was in a furious rage, and he sent and killed all the male children in Bethlehem and in all that region who were two years old or under, according to the time which he had ascertained from the wise men

2.17 Then was fulfilled what was spoken by the prophet Jeremiah: 2.18 "A voice was heard in Ramah, wailing and loud lamentation, Rachel weeping for her children; she refused to be consoled, because they were no more."

2.19 But when Herod died, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared in a dream to Joseph in Egypt, saying,

2.20 "Rise, take the child and his mother, and go to the land of Israel, for those who sought the child's life are dead." 2.21 And he rose and took the child and his

mother, and went to the land of Israel. 2.22 But when he heard that Archelaus reigned over Judea in place of his father Herod, he was afraid to go there, and being warned in a dream he withdrew to the district of Galilee.

2.23 And he went and dwelt in a city called Nazareth, that what was spoken by the prophets might be fulfilled, "He shall be called a Nazarene."

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John the Baptist

1.1 The beginning of the gospel of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. 1.2 As it is written in Isaiah the prophet, "Behold, I send my messenger before thy face, who shall prepare thy way; 1.3 the voice of one crying in the wilderness: Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight--" 1.4 John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, preaching a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. 1.5 And there went out to him all the country of Judea, and all the people of Jerusalem; and they were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. 1.6 Now John was clothed with camel's hair, and had a leather girdle around his waist, and ate locusts and wild honey.

John Preaches a Messiah

3.11 "I baptize you with water for repentance, but he who is coming after me is mightier than I, whose sandals I am not worthy to carry; he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and with fire. 3.12 His winnowing fork is in his hand, and he will clear his threshing floor and gather his wheat into the granary, but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

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John the Baptist

3.1 In those days came John the Baptist, preaching in the wilderness of Judea, 3.2 "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." 3.3 For this is he who was spoken of by the prophet Isaiah when he said, "The voice of one crying in the wilderness: Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight." 3.4 Now John wore a garment of camel's hair, and a leather girdle around his waist; and his food was locusts and wild honey. 3.5 Then went out to him Jerusalem and all Judea and all the region about the Jordan, 3.6 and they were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins.

John Preaches a Messiah

1.7 And he preached, saying, "After me comes he who is mightier than I, the thong of whose sandals I am not worthy to stoop down and untie. 1.8 I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

LUKE

John the Baptist

3.1 In the fifteenth year of the reign of Tiber'i-us Caesar, Pontius Pilate being governor of Judea, and Herod being tetrarch of Galilee, and his brother Philip tetrarch of the region of Iturae'a and Trachoni'tis, and Lysa'ni-as tetrarch of Abile'ne, 3.2 in the high-priesthood of Annas and Ca'iaphas, the word of God came to John the son of Zechari'ah in the wilderness; 3.3 and he went into all the region about the Jordan, preaching a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. 3.4 As it is written in the book of the words of Isaiah the prophet, "The voice of one crying in the wilderness: Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight. 3.5 Every valley shall be filled, and every mountain and hill shall be brought low, and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough ways shall be made smooth; 3.6 and all flesh shall see the salvation of God."

John Preaches a Messiah

3.15 As the people were in expectation, and all men questioned in their hearts concerning John, whether perhaps he were the Christ, 3.16 John answered them all, "I baptize you with water; but he who is mightier than I is coming, the thong of whose sandals I am not worthy to untie; he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and with fire. 3.17 His winnowing fork is in his hand, to clear his threshing floor, and to gather the wheat into his granary, but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire." 3.18 So, with many other exhortations, he preached good news to the people.

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John the Baptist

1.19 And this is the testimony of John, when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, "Who are you?" 1.20 He confessed, he did not deny, but confessed, "I am not the Christ." 1.21 And they asked him, "What then? Are you Elijah?" He said, "I am not." "Are you the prophet?" And he answered, "No." 1.22 They said to him then, "Who are you? Let us have an answer for those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?" 1.23 He said, "I am the voice of one crying in the wilderness, 'Make straight the way of the Lord,' as the prophet Isaiah said."

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The Baptism of Jesus

1.9 In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. 1.10 And when he came up out of the water, immediately he saw the heavens opened and the Spirit descending upon him like a dove; 1.11 and a voice came from heaven, "Thou art my beloved Son; with thee I am well pleased."

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John Preaches Repentance

3.7 But when he saw many of the Pharisees and Sadducees coming for baptism, he said to them, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come?"

3.8 Bear fruit that befits repentance, 3.9 and do not presume to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our father'; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. 3.10 Even now the axe is laid to the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire.

The Baptism of Jesus

3.13 Then Jesus came from Galilee to the Jordan to John, to be baptized by him
3.14 John would have prevented him, saying, "I need to be baptized by you, and do you come to me?" 3.15 But Jesus answered him, "Let it be so now; for thus it is fitting for us to fulfil all righteousness." Then he consented. 3.16 And when Jesus was baptized, he went up immediately from the water, and behold, the heavens were opened and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove, and alighting on him; 3.17 and lo, a voice from heaven, saying, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased."

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John Preaches Repentance

3.7 He said therefore to the multitudes that came out to be baptized by him, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? 3.8 Bear fruits that befit repentance, and do not begin to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our father'; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham.

3.9 Even now the axe is laid to the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire."

The Baptism of Jesus

3.21 Now when all the people were baptized, and when Jesus also had been baptized and was praying, the heaven was opened, 3.22 and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form, as a dove, and a voice came from heaven, "Thou art my beloved Son; with thee I am well pleased."

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John Preaches Repentance

1.24 Now they had been sent from the Pharisees. 1.25 They asked him, "Then why are you baptizing, if you are neither the Christ, nor Elijah, nor the prophet?" 1.26 John answered them, "I baptize with water; but among you stands one whom you do not know, 1.27 even he who comes after me, the thong of whose sandal I am not worthy to untie." 1.28 This took place in Bethany beyond the Jordan, where John was baptizing.

The Baptism of Jesus

1.29 The next day he saw Jesus coming toward him, and said, "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world! 1.30 This is he of whom I said, 'After me comes a man who ranks before me, for he was before me.' 1.31 I myself did not know him; but for this I came baptizing with water, that he might be revealed to Israel." 1.32 And John bore witness, "I saw the Spirit descend as a dove from heaven, and it remained on him. 1.33 I myself did not know him; but he who sent me to baptize with water said to me, 'He on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain, this is he who baptizes with the Holy Spirit.' 1.34 And I have seen and have borne witness that this is the Son of God."

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The Temptation

1.12 The Spirit immediately drove him out into the wilderness. 1.13 And he was in the wilderness forty days, tempted by Satan; and he was with the wild beasts; and the angels ministered to him.

MATTHEW

The Temptation

4.1 Then Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil

4.2 And he fasted forty days and forty nights, and afterward he was hungry. 4.3 And the tempter came and said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command these stones to become loaves of bread." 4.4 But he answered, "It is written, 'Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God.'" 4.5 Then the devil took him to the holy city, and set him on the pinnacle of the temple, 4.6 and said to him, "If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down; for it is written, 'He will give his angels charge of you,' and 'On their hands they will bear you up, lest you strike your foot against a stone.'" 4.7 Jesus said to him, "Again it is written, 'You shall not tempt the Lord your God.'" 4.8 Again, the devil took him to a very high mountain, and showed him all the kingdoms of the world and the glory of them; 4.9 and he said to him, "All these I will give you, if you will fall down and worship me." 4.10 Then Jesus said to him, "Begone, Satan! for it is written, 'You shall worship the Lord your God and him only shall you serve.'" 4.11 Then the devil left him, and behold, angels came and ministered to him.

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The Temptation

4.1 And Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan, and was led by the Spirit 4.2 for forty days in the wilderness, tempted by the devil. And he ate nothing in those days; and when they were ended, he was hungry. 4.3 The devil said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become bread." 4.4 And Jesus answered him, "It is written, 'Man shall not live by bread alone.'" 4.5 And the devil took him up, and showed him all the kingdoms of the world in a moment of time, 4.6 and said to him, "To you I will give all this authority and their glory; for it has been delivered to me, and I give it to whom I will. 4.7 If you, then, will worship me, it shall all be yours." 4.8 And Jesus answered him, "It is written, 'You shall worship the Lord your God, and him only shall you serve.'" 4.9 And he took him to Jerusalem, and set him on the pinnacle of the temple, and said to him, "If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down from here; 4.10 for it is written, 'He will give his angels charge of you, to guard you,' 4.11 and 'On their hands they will bear you up, lest you strike your foot against a stone.'" 4.12 And Jesus answered him, "It is said, 'You shall not tempt the Lord your God.'" 4.13 And when the devil had ended every temptation, he departed from him until an opportune time.

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First Preaching in Galilee

1.14 Now after John was arrested, Jesus came into Galilee, preaching the gospel of God, 1.15 and saying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand; repent, and believe in the gospel."

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First Preaching in Galilee

4.12 Now when he heard that John had been arrested, he withdrew into Galilee;
4.13 and leaving Nazareth he went and dwelt in Capernaum by the sea, in the territory of Zebulun and Naphthali, 4.14 that what was spoken by the prophet Isaiah might be fulfilled: 4.15 "The land of Zebulun and the land of Naphthali, toward the sea, across the Jordan, Galilee of the Gentiles-- 4.16 the people who sat in darkness have seen a great light, and for those who sat in the region and shadow of death light has dawned." 4.17 From that time Jesus began to preach, saying, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand."

LUKE

First Preaching in Galilee

4.14 And Jesus returned in the power of the Spirit into Galilee, and a report concerning him went out through all the surrounding country. 4.15 And he taught in their synagogues, being glorified by all.

JOHN

First Preaching in Galilee

4.1 Now when the Lord knew that the Pharisees had heard that Jesus was making and baptizing more disciples than John 4.2 (although Jesus himself did not baptize, but only his disciples), 4.3 he left Judea and departed again to Galilee.

MARK

Calling the First Disciples

1.16 And passing along by the Sea of Galilee, he saw Simon and Andrew the brother of Simon casting a net in the sea; for they were fishermen. 1.17 And Jesus said to them, "Follow me and I will make you become fishers of men." 1.18 And immediately they left their nets and followed him. 1.19 And going on a little farther, he saw James the son of Zeb'edee and John his brother, who were in their boat mending the nets. 1.20 And immediately he called them; and they left their father Zeb'edee in the boat with the hired servants, and followed him.

MATTHEW

Calling the First Disciples

4.18 As he walked by the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon who is called Peter and Andrew his brother, casting a net into the sea; for they were fishermen
4.19 And he said to them, "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men." 4.20 Immediately they left their nets and followed him. 4.21 And going on from there he saw two other brothers, James the son of Zeb'edee and John his brother, in the boat with Zeb'edee their father, mending their nets, and he called them. 4.22 Immediately they left the boat and their father, and followed him.

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JOHN

Calling the First Disciples

1.35 The next day again John was standing with two of his disciples; 1.36 and he looked at Jesus as he walked, and said, "Behold, the Lamb of God!"
1.37 The two disciples heard him say this, and they followed Jesus. 1.38 Jesus turned, and saw them following, and said to them, "What do you seek?" And they said to him, "Rabbi" (which means Teacher), "where are you staying?" 1.39 He said to them, "Come and see." They came and saw where he was staying; and they stayed with him that day, for it was about the tenth hour. 1.40 One of the two who heard John speak, and followed him, was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. 1.41 He first found his brother Simon, and said to him, "We have found the Messiah" (which means Christ). 1.42 He brought him to Jesus. Jesus looked at him, and said, "So you are Simon the son of John? You shall be called Cephas" (which means Peter).
1.43 The next day Jesus decided to go to Galilee. And he found Philip and said to him, "Follow me." 1.44 Now Philip was from Beth-sa'ida, the city of Andrew and Peter. 1.45 Philip found Nathan'a-el, and said to him, "We have found him of whom Moses in the law and also the prophets wrote, Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph." 1.46 Nathan'a-el said to him, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" Philip said to him, "Come and see." 1.47 Jesus saw Nathan'a-el coming to him, and said of him, "Behold, an Israelite indeed, in whom is no guile!" 1.48 Nathan'a-el said to him, "How do you know me?" Jesus answered him, "Before Philip called you, when you were under the fig tree, I saw you." 1.49 Nathan'a-el answered him, "Rabbi, you are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!" 1.50 Jesus answered him, "Because I said to you, I saw you under the fig tree, do you believe? You shall see greater things than these." 1.51 And he said to him, "Truly, truly, I say to you, you will see heaven opened, and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of man."

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On Authority (in Capernaum)

1.21 And they went into Caper'na-um; and immediately on the sabbath he entered the synagogue and taught. 1.22 And they were astonished at his teaching, for he taught them as one who had authority, and not as the scribes. 1.23 And immediately there was in their synagogue a man with an unclean spirit; 1.24 and he cried out, "What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are, the Holy One of God." 1.25 But Jesus rebuked him, saying, "Be silent, and come out of him!" 1.26 And the unclean spirit, convulsing him and crying with a loud voice, came out of him. 1.27 And they were all amazed, so that they questioned among themselves, saying, "What is this? A new teaching! With authority he commands even the unclean spirits, and they obey him." 1.28 And at once his fame spread everywhere throughout all the surrounding region of Galilee.

Healing Peter's Mother-in-law

1.29 And immediately he left the synagogue, and entered the house of Simon and Andrew, with James and John. 1.30 Now Simon's mother-in-law lay sick with a fever, and immediately they told him of her. 1.31 And he came and took her by the hand and lifted her up, and the fever left her; and she served them.

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Conclusion On Authority (in Capernaum)

7.28 And when Jesus finished these sayings, the crowds were astonished at his teaching, 7.29 for he taught them as one who had authority, and not as their scribes.

Healing Peter's Mother-in-law

8.14 And when Jesus entered Peter's house, he saw his mother-in-law lying sick with a fever; 8.15 he touched her hand, and the fever left her, and she rose and served him.

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On Authority (in Capernaum)

4.31 And he went down to Caper'na-um, a city of Galilee. And he was teaching them on the sabbath; 4.32 and they were astonished at his teaching, for his word was with authority. 4.33 And in the synagogue there was a man who had the spirit of an unclean demon; and he cried out with a loud voice, 4.34 " Ah! What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are, the Holy One of God." 4.35 But Jesus rebuked him, saying, "Be silent, and come out of him!" And when the demon had thrown him down in the midst, he came out of him, having done him no harm. 4.36 And they were all amazed and said to one another, "What is this word? For with authority and power he commands the unclean spirits, and they come out." 4.37 And reports of him went out into every place in the surrounding region.

Healing Peter's Mother-in-law

4.38 And he arose and left the synagogue, and entered Simon's house. Now Simon's mother-in-law was ill with a high fever, and they besought him for her. 4.39 And he stood over her and rebuked the fever, and it left her; and immediately she rose and served them.

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Healing the Sick at Evening

1.32That evening, at sundown, they brought to him all who were sick or possessed with demons. 1.33And the whole city was gathered together about the door.

1.34And he healed many who were sick with various diseases, and cast out many demons; and he would not permit the demons to speak, because they knew him.

Departing from Capernaum

1.35And in the morning, a great while before day, he rose and went out to a lonely place, and there he prayed.

1.36And Simon and those who were with him pursued him, 1.37and they found him and said to him, "Every one is searching for you." 1.38And he said to them, "Let us go on to the next towns, that I may preach there also; for that is why I came out."

Preaching in Galilee

1.39And he went throughout all Galilee, preaching in their synagogues and casting out demons.

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Healing the Sick at Evening

8.16 That evening they brought to him many who were possessed with demons; and he cast out the spirits with a word, and healed all who were sick. 8.17 This was to fulfil what was spoken by the prophet Isaiah, "He took our infirmities and bore our diseases."

Preaching in Galilee

4.23 And he went about all Galilee, teaching in their synagogues and preaching the gospel of the kingdom and healing every disease and every infirmity among the people

4.24 So his fame spread throughout all Syria, and they brought him all the sick, those afflicted with various diseases and pains, demoniacs, epileptics, and paralytics, and he healed them. 4.25 And great crowds followed him from Galilee and the Decap'olis and Jerusalem and Judea and from beyond the Jordan.

LUKE

Healing the Sick at Evening

4.40 Now when the sun was setting, all those who had any that were sick with various diseases brought them to him; and he laid his hands on every one of them and healed them. 4.41 And demons also came out of many, crying, "You are the Son of God!" But he rebuked them, and would not allow them to speak, because they knew that he was the Christ.

Departing from Capernaum

4.42 And when it was day he departed and went into a lonely place. And the people sought him and came to him, and would have kept him from leaving them; 4.43 but he said to them, "I must preach the good news of the kingdom of God to the other cities also; for I was sent for this purpose."

Preaching in Galilee (Judea)

4.44 And he was preaching in the synagogues of Judea.

Miraculous Catch of Fish

5.1 While the people pressed upon him to hear the word of God, he was standing by the lake of Gennes'aret. 5.2 And he saw two boats by the lake; but the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. 5.3 Getting into one of the boats, which was Simon's, he asked him to put out a little from the land. And he sat down and taught the people from the boat. 5.4 And when he had ceased speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into the deep and let down your nets for a catch." 5.5 And Simon answered, "Master, we toiled all night and took nothing! But at your word I will let down the nets." 5.6 And when they had done this, they enclosed a great shoal of fish; and as their nets were breaking, 5.7 they beckoned to their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both the boats, so that they began to sink. 5.8 But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, "Depart from me, for I am a sinful man, O Lord." 5.9 For he was astonished, and all that were with him, at the catch of fish which they had taken; 5.10 and so also were James and John, sons of Zeb'edee, who were partners with Simon. And Jesus said to Simon, "Do not be afraid; henceforth you will be catching men." 5.11 And when they had brought their boats to land, they left everything and followed him.

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Introduction to the Sermon on the Mount/Plain

- 5.1 Seeing the crowds, he went up on the mountain, and when he sat down his disciples came to him
5.2 And he opened his mouth and taught them, saying:

The Beatitudes

- 5.3. "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven
5.4 "Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted. 5.5 "Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth. 5.6 " Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied. 5.7 "Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy. 5.8 "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God. 5.9 "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called sons of God. 5.10 "Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. 5.11 "Blessed are you when men revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. 5.12 Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for so men persecuted the prophets who were before you.

The Beatitudes

- 6.20 And he lifted up his eyes on his disciples, and said: "Blessed are you poor, for yours is the kingdom of God. 6.21 " Blessed are you that hunger now, for you shall be satisfied. "Blessed are you that weep now, for you shall laugh. 6.22 " Blessed are you when men hate you, and when they exclude you and revile you, and cast out your name as evil, on account of the Son of man! 6.23 Rejoice in that day, and leap for joy, for behold, your reward is great in heaven; for so their fathers did to the prophets.

Luke's Woes

- 6.24 " But woe to you that are rich, for you have received your consolation. 6.25 " Woe to you that are full now, for you shall hunger. "Woe to you that laugh now, for you shall mourn and weep. 6.26 " Woe to you, when all men speak well of you, for so their fathers did to the false prophets.

Tell her then to help me." 10.41 But the Lord answered her, "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and troubled about many things; 10.42 one thing is needful. Mary has chosen the good portion, which shall not be taken away from her."

On Adultery

5.28 But I say to you that every one who looks at a woman lustfully has already committed adultery with her in his heart. 5.29 If your right eye causes you to sin, pluck it out and throw it away; it is better that you lose one of your members than that your whole body be thrown into hell. 5.30 And if your right hand causes you to sin, cut it off and throw it away; it is better that you lose one of your members than that your whole body go into hell.

On Swearing

5.33. "Again you have heard that it was said to the men of old, 'You shall not swear falsely, but shall perform to the Lord what you have sworn.'

5.34 But I say to you, Do not swear at all, either by heaven, for it is the throne of God, 5.35 or by the earth, for it is his footstool, or by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great King. 5.36 And do not swear by your head, for you cannot make one hair white or black. 5.37 Let what you say be simply 'Yes' or 'No'; anything more than this comes from evil.

Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin; 6.29 yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. 6.30 But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which today is alive and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you, O men of little faith? 6.31 Therefore do not be anxious, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?' 6.32 For the Gentiles seek all these things; and your heavenly Father knows that you need them all. 6.33 But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things shall be yours as well. 6.34 "Therefore do not be anxious about tomorrow, for tomorrow will be anxious for itself. Let the day's own trouble be sufficient for the day.

7.1. "Judge not, that you be not judged
7.2 For with the judgment you pronounce you will be judged, and the measure you give will be the measure you get. 7.3 Why do you see the speck that is in your brother's eye, but do not notice the log that is in your own eye? 7.4 Or how can you say to your brother, 'Let me take the speck out of your eye,' when there is the log in your own eye? 7.5 You hypocrite, first take the log out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to take the speck out of your brother's eye.

For the measure you give will be the measure you get back." 6.39 He also told them a parable: "Can a blind man lead a blind man? The Golden Rule

6.31 And as you wish that men would do to you, do so to them. 6.32 " If you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners love those who love them. 6.33 And if you do good to those who do good to you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners do the same. 6.34 And if you lend to those from whom you hope to receive, what credit is that to you? Hearing and Doing

7.24 "Every one then who hears these words of mine and does them will be like a wise man who built his house upon the rock; 7.25 and the rain fell, and the floods came, and the winds blew and beat upon that house, but it did not fall, because it had been founded on the rock. 7.26 And every one who hears these words of mine and does not do them will be like a foolish man who built his house upon the sand; 7.27 and the rain fell, and the floods came, and the winds blew and beat against that house, and it fell; and great was the fall of it."

Truly, I say to you, they have received their reward. 6.3 But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, 6.4 so that your alms may be in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

6.5."And when you pray, you must not be like the hypocrites; for they love to stand and pray in the synagogues and at the street corners, that they may be seen by men. Truly, I say to you, they have received their reward

6.6 But when you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you. 6.7 "And in praying do not heap up empty phrases as the Gentiles do; for they think that they will be heard for their many words. 6.8 Do not be like them, for your Father knows what you need before you ask him.

1.40 And a leper came to him beseeching him, and kneeling said to him, "If you will, you can make me clean." 1.41 Moved with pity, he stretched out his hand and touched him, and said to him, "I will; be clean." 1.42 And immediately the leprosy left him, and he was made clean. 1.43 And he sternly charged him, and sent him away at once, 1.44 and said to him, "See that you say nothing to any one; but go, show yourself to the priest, and offer for your cleansing what Moses commanded, for a proof to the people." 1.45 But he went out and began to talk freely about it, and to spread the news, so that Jesus could no longer openly enter a town, but was out in the country; and people came to him from every quarter.

4.46 So he came again to Cana in Galilee, where he had made the water wine. 13.1 There were some present at that very time who told him of the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices. 13.2 And he answered them, "Do you think that these Galileans were worse sinners than all the other Galileans, because they suffered thus? 13.3 I tell you, No; but unless you repent you will all likewise perish. 13.4 Or those eighteen upon whom the tower in Silo'am fell and killed them, do you think that they were worse offenders than all the others who dwelt in Jerusalem? 13.5 I tell you, No; but unless you repent you will all likewise perish." 13.6 And he told this parable: "A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard; and he came seeking fruit on it and found none. 13.7 And he said to the vinedresser, 'Lo, these three years I have come seeking fruit on this fig tree, and I find none. Cut it down; why should it use up the ground?' 13.8 And he answered him, 'Let it alone, sir, this year also, till I dig about it and put on manure. 13.9 And if it bears fruit next year, well and good; but if not, you can cut it down.'"

Plucking Grain on the Sabbath

2.23 One sabbath he was going through the grainfields; and as they made their way his disciples began to pluck heads of grain. 2.24 And the Pharisees said to him, "Look, why are they doing what is not lawful on the sabbath?" 2.25 And he said to them, "Have you never read what David did, when he was in need and was hungry, he and those who were with him: 2.26 how he entered the house of God, when Abi'athar was high priest, and ate the bread of the Presence, which it is not lawful for any but the priests to eat, and also gave it to those who were with him?" 2.27 And he said to them, "The sabbath was made for man, not man for the sabbath; 2.28 so the Son of man is lord even of the sabbath."

Healing a Man with a Withered Hand

3.1 Again he entered the synagogue, and a man was there who had a withered hand. 3.2 And they watched him, to see whether he would heal him on the sabbath, so that they might accuse him. 3.3 And he said to the man who had the withered hand, "Come here." 3.4 And he said to them, "Is it lawful on the sabbath to do good or to do harm, to save life or to kill?" But they were silent. 3.5 And he looked around at them with anger, grieved at their hardness of heart, and said to the man, "Stretch out your hand." He stretched it out, and his hand was restored. 3.6 The Pharisees went out, and immediately held counsel with the Herodians against him, how to destroy him.

12.1 At that time Jesus went through the grainfields on the sabbath; his disciples were hungry, and they began to pluck heads of grain and to eat
12.2 But when the Pharisees saw it, they said to him, "Look, your disciples are doing what is not lawful to do on the sabbath." 12.3 He said to them, "Have you not read what David did, when he was hungry, and those who were with him: 12.4 how he entered the house of God and ate the bread of the Presence, which it was not lawful for him to eat nor for those who were with him, but only for the priests? 12.5 Or have you not read in the law how on the sabbath the priests in the temple profane the sabbath, and are guiltless? 12.6 I tell you, something greater than the temple is here. 12.7 And if you had known what this means, 'I desire mercy, and not sacrifice,' you would not have condemned the guiltless. 12.8 For the Son of man is lord of the sabbath."

Healing a Man with a Withered Hand

12.9 And he went on from there, and entered their synagogue. 12.10 And behold, there was a man with a withered hand. And they asked him, "Is it lawful to heal on the sabbath?" so that they might accuse him. 12.11 He said to them, "What man of you, if he has one sheep and it falls into a pit on the sabbath, will not lay hold of it and lift it out? 12.12 Of how much more value is a man than a sheep! So it is lawful to do good on the sabbath." 12.13 Then he said to the man, "Stretch out your hand." And the man stretched it out, and it was restored, whole like the other. 12.14 But the Pharisees went out and took counsel against him, how to destroy him

Plucking Grain on the Sabbath

6.1 On a sabbath, while he was going through the grainfields, his disciples plucked and ate some heads of grain, rubbing them in their hands. 6.2 But some of the Pharisees said, "Why are you doing what is not lawful to do on the sabbath?" 6.3 And Jesus answered, "Have you not read what David did when he was hungry, he and those who were with him: 6.4 how he entered the house of God, and took and ate the bread of the Presence, which it is not lawful for any but the priests to eat, and also gave it to those with him?" 6.5 And he said to them, "The Son of man is lord of the sabbath."

Healing a Man with a Withered Hand

6.6 On another sabbath, when he entered the synagogue and taught, a man was there whose right hand was withered. 6.7 And the scribes and the Pharisees watched him, to see whether he would heal on the sabbath, so that they might find an accusation against him. 6.8 But he knew their thoughts, and he said to the man who had the withered hand, "Come and stand here." And he rose and stood there. 6.9 And Jesus said to them, "I ask you, is it lawful on the sabbath to do good or to do harm, to save life or to destroy it?" 6.10 And he looked around on them all, and said to him, "Stretch out your hand." And he did so, and his hand was restored. 6.11 But they were filled with fury and discussed with one another what they might do to Jesus.

Healing the Multitudes

3.7 Jesus withdrew with his disciples to the sea, and a great multitude from Galilee followed; also from Judea 3.8 and Jerusalem and Idume'a and from beyond the Jordan and from about Tyre and Sidon a great multitude, hearing all that he did, came to him. 3.9 And he told his disciples to have a boat ready for him because of the crowd, lest they should crush him; 3.10 for he had healed many, so that all who had diseases pressed upon him to touch him. 3.11 And whenever the unclean spirits beheld him, they fell down before him and cried out, "You are the Son of God." 3.12 And he strictly ordered them not to make him known.

17.7 "Will any one of you, who has a servant plowing or keeping sheep, say to him when he has come in from the field, 'Come at once and sit down at table'? 17.8 Will he not rather say to him, 'Prepare supper for me, and gird yourself and serve me, till I eat and drink; and afterward you shall eat and drink'? 17.9 Does he thank the servant because he did what was commanded? 17.10 So you also, when you have done all that is commanded you, say, 'We are unworthy servants; we have only done what was our duty.'"

A House Divided

Healing a Woman of Infirmity

On Parables

13.10 Then the disciples came and said to him, "Why do you speak to them in parables?" 13.11 And he answered them, "To you it has been given to know the secrets of the kingdom of heaven, but to them it has not been given. 13.12 For to him who has will more be given, and he will have abundance; but from him who has not, even what he has will be taken away. 13.13 This is why I speak to them in parables, because seeing they do not see, and hearing they do not hear, nor do they understand. 13.14 With them indeed is fulfilled the prophecy of Isaiah which says: 'You shall indeed hear but never understand, and you shall indeed see but never perceive. 13.15 For this people's heart has grown dull, and their ears are heavy of hearing, and their eyes they have closed, lest they should perceive with their eyes, and hear with their ears, and understand with their heart, and turn for me to heal them.'

13.18 Hear then the parable of the sower. 13.19 When any one hears the word of the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what is sown in his heart; this is what was sown along the path. 13.20 As for what was sown on rocky ground, this is he who hears the word and immediately receives it with joy; 13.21 yet he has no root in himself, but endures for a while, and when tribulation or persecution arises on account of the word, immediately he falls away. 13.22 As for what was sown among thorns, this is he who hears the word, but the cares of the world and the delight in riches choke the word, and it proves unfruitful. 13.23 As for what was sown on good soil, this is he who hears the word and understands it; he indeed bears fruit, and yields, in one case a hundredfold, in another sixty, and in another thirty."

On Parables

8.9 And when his disciples asked him what this parable meant, 8.10 he said, "To you it has been given to know the secrets of the kingdom of God; but for others they are in parables, so that seeing they may not see, and hearing they may not understand.

The Interpretation of the Sower

8.11 Now the parable is this: The seed is the word of God. 8.12 The ones along the path are those who have heard; then the devil comes and takes away the word from their hearts, that they may not believe and be saved. 8.13 And the ones on the rock are those who, when they hear the word, receive it with joy; but these have no root, they believe for a while and in time of temptation fall away. 8.14 And as for what fell among the thorns, they are those who hear, but as they go on their way they are choked by the cares and riches and pleasures of life, and their fruit does not mature. 8.15 And as for that in the good soil, they are those who, hearing the word, hold it fast in an honest and good heart, and bring forth fruit with patience.

13.24 Another parable he put before them, saying, "The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a man who sowed good seed in his field;
13.25 but while men were sleeping, his enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat, and went away. 13.26 So when the plants came up and bore grain, then the weeds appeared also. 13.27 And the servants of the householder came and said to him, 'Sir, did you not sow good seed in your field? How then has it weeds?' 13.28 He said to them, 'An enemy has done this.' The servants said to him, 'Then do you want us to go and gather them?' 13.29 But he said, 'No; lest in gathering the weeds you root up the wheat along with them. 13.30 Let both grow together until the harvest; and at harvest time I will tell the reapers, Gather the weeds first and bind them in bundles to be burned, but gather the wheat into my barn.'"

13.33 He told them another parable. "The kingdom of heaven is like leaven which a woman took and hid in three measures of flour, till it was all leavened."

The Blessedness of the Disciples

10.23 Then turning to the disciples he said privately, "Blessed are the eyes which see what you see! 10.24 For I tell you that many prophets and kings desired to see what you see, and did not see it, and to hear what you hear, and did not hear it."

The Parable of the Leaven

13.20 And again he said, "To what shall I compare the kingdom of God? 13.21 It is like leaven which a woman took and hid in three measures of flour, till it was all leavened." 13.22 He went on his way through towns and villages, teaching, and journeying toward Jerusalem.

4.21 And he said to them, "Is a lamp brought in to be put under a bushel, or under a bed, and not on a stand?"

4.22 For there is nothing hid, except to be made manifest; nor is anything secret, except to come to light. 4.23 If any man has ears to hear, let him hear." 4.24 And he said to them, "Take heed what you hear; the measure you give will be the measure you get, and still more will be given you. 4.25 For to him who has will more be given; and from him who has not, even what he has will be taken away."

MATTHEW

5.15 Nor do men light a lamp and put it under a bushel, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house. 5.16

Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven.

10.26 "So have no fear of them; for nothing is covered that will not be revealed, or hidden that will not be known. 10.27 What I tell you in the dark, utter in the light; and what you hear whispered, proclaim upon the housetops. 10.28 And do not fear those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; rather fear him who can destroy both soul and body in hell. 10.29 Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? And not one of them will fall to the ground without your Father's will. 10.30 But even the hairs of your head are all numbered. 10.31 Fear not, therefore; you are of more value than many sparrows.

10.32 So every one who acknowledges me before men, I also will acknowledge before my Father who is in heaven; 10.33 but whoever denies me before men, I also will deny before my Father who is in heaven. For with the judgment you pronounce you will be judged, and the measure you give will be the measure you get. 7.3 Why do you see the speck that is in your brother's eye, but do not notice the log that is in your own eye? 7.4 Or how can you say to your brother, 'Let me take the speck out of your eye,' when there is the log in your own eye? 7.5

You hypocrite, first take the log out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to take the speck out of your brother's eye. For to him who has will more be given, and he will have abundance; but from him who has not, even what he has will be taken away. 13.13 This is why I speak to them in parables, because seeing they do not see, and hearing they do not hear, nor do they understand. 13.14 With them indeed is fulfilled the prophecy of Isaiah which says: 'You shall indeed hear but never understand, and you shall indeed see but never perceive. 13.15 For this people's heart has grown dull, and their ears are heavy of hearing, and their eyes they have closed, lest they should perceive with their eyes, and hear with their ears, and understand with their heart, and turn for me to heal them.'

The Purpose of Parables

8.16 " No one after lighting a lamp covers it with a vessel, or puts it under a bed, but puts it on a stand, that those who enter may see the light. 8.17 For nothing is hid that shall not be made manifest, nor anything secret that shall not be known and come to light. 8.18 Take heed then how you hear; for to him who has will more be given, and from him who has not, even what he thinks that he has will be taken away."

No one after lighting a lamp puts it in a cellar or under a bushel, but on a stand, that those who enter may see the light.

Nothing is covered up that will not be revealed, or hidden that will not be known. 12.3 Therefore whatever you have said in the dark shall be heard in the light, and what you have whispered in private rooms shall be proclaimed upon the housetops.

Take heed then how you hear; for to him who has will more be given, and from him who has not, even what he thinks that he has will be taken away."

MARK

The Seed and the Harvest

4.26 And he said, "The kingdom of God is as if a man should scatter seed upon the ground, 4.27and should sleep and rise night and day, and the seed should sprout and grow, he knows not how. 4.28The earth produces of itself, first the blade, then the ear, then the full grain in the ear. 4.29But when the grain is ripe, at once he puts in the sickle, because the harvest has come."

The Parable of the Mustard Seed

4.30And he said, "With what can we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable shall we use for it? 4.31It is like a grain of mustard seed, which, when sown upon the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; 4.32yet when it is sown it grows up and becomes the greatest of all shrubs, and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade."

Jesus' Use of Parables

4.33With many such parables he spoke the word to them, as they were able to hear it; 4.34he did not speak to them without a parable, but privately to his own disciples he explained everything. 4.35On that day, when evening had come, he said to them, "Let us go across to the other side." 4.36And leaving the crowd, they took him with them in the boat, just as he was. And other boats were with him. 4.37And a great storm of wind arose, and the waves beat into the boat, so that the boat was already filling. 4.38But he was in the stern, asleep on the cushion; and they woke him and said to him, "Teacher, do you not care if we perish?" 4.39And he awoke and rebuked the wind, and said to the sea, "Peace! Be still!" And the wind ceased, and there was a great calm. 4.40He said to them, "Why are you afraid? Have you no faith?" 4.41And they were filled with awe, and said to one another, "Who then is this, that even wind and sea obey him?"

13.31 Another parable he put before them, saying, "The kingdom of heaven is like a grain of mustard seed which a man took and sowed in his field; 13.32 it is the smallest of all seeds, but when it has grown it is the greatest of shrubs and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches."

Jesus' Use of Parables

13.34 All this Jesus said to the crowds in parables; indeed he said nothing to them without a parable. 13.35 This was to fulfil what was spoken by the prophet: "I will open my mouth in parables, I will utter what has been hidden since the foundation of the world."

5.1 They came to the other side of the sea, to the country of the Ger'asenes. 5.2 And when he had come out of the boat, there met him out of the tombs a man with an unclean spirit, 5.3 who lived among the tombs; and no one could bind him any more, even with a chain; 5.4 for he had often been bound with fetters and chains, but the chains he wrenched apart, and the fetters he broke in pieces; and no one had the strength to subdue him. 5.5 Night and day among the tombs and on the mountains he was always crying out, and bruising himself with stones. 5.6 And when he saw Jesus from afar, he ran and worshiped him; 5.7 and crying out with a loud voice, he said, "What have you to do with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? I adjure you by God, do not torment me." 5.8 For he had said to him, "Come out of the man, you unclean spirit!" 5.9 And Jesus asked him, "What is your name?" He replied, "My name is Legion; for we are many." 5.10 And he begged him eagerly not to send them out of the country. 5.11 Now a great herd of swine was feeding there on the hillside; 5.12 and they begged him, "Send us to the swine, let us enter them." 5.13 So he gave them leave. And the unclean spirits came out, and entered the swine; and the herd, numbering about two thousand, rushed down the steep bank into the sea, and were drowned in the sea. 5.14 The herdsmen fled, and told it in the city and in the country. And people came to see what it was that had happened. 5.15 And they came to Jesus, and saw the demoniac sitting there, clothed and in his right mind, the man who had had the legion; and they were afraid. 5.16 And those who had seen it told what had happened to the demoniac and to the swine. 5.17 And they began to beg Jesus to depart from their neighborhood. 5.18 And as he was getting into the boat, the man who had been possessed with demons begged him that he might be with him. 5.19 But he refused, and said to him, "Go home to your friends, and tell them how much the Lord has done for you, and how he has had mercy on you." 5.20 And he went away and began to proclaim in the Decap'olis how much Jesus had done for him; and all men marveled.

The Gadarene/Gerasene Demoniac

8.28 And when he came to the other side, to the country of the Gadarenes, two demoniacs met him, coming out of the tombs, so fierce that no one could pass that way. 8.29 And behold, they cried out, "What have you to do with us, O Son of God? Have you come here to torment us before the time?" 8.30 Now a herd of many swine was feeding at some distance from them. 8.31 And the demons begged him, "If you cast us out, send us away into the herd of swine." 8.32 And he said to them, "Go." So they came out and went into the swine; and behold, the whole herd rushed down the steep bank into the sea, and perished in the waters. 8.33 The herdsmen fled, and going into the city they told everything, and what had happened to the demoniacs. 8.34 And behold, all the city came out to meet Jesus; and when they saw him, they begged him to leave their neighborhood.

8.26 Then they arrived at the country of the Ger'asenes, which is opposite Galilee. 8.27 And as he stepped out on land, there met him a man from the city who had demons; for a long time he had worn no clothes, and he lived not in a house but among the tombs. 8.28 When he saw Jesus, he cried out and fell down before him, and said with a loud voice, "What have you to do with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? I beseech you, do not torment me." 8.29 For he had commanded the unclean spirit to come out of the man. (For many a time it had seized him; he was kept under guard, and bound with chains and fetters, but he broke the bonds and was driven by the demon into the desert.) 8.30 Jesus then asked him, "What is your name?" And he said, "Legion"; for many demons had entered him. 8.31 And they begged him not to command them to depart into the abyss. 8.32 Now a large herd of swine was feeding there on the hillside; and they begged him to let them enter these. So he gave them leave. 8.33 Then the demons came out of the man and entered the swine, and the herd rushed down the steep bank into the lake and were drowned. 8.34 When the herdsmen saw what had happened, they fled, and told it in the city and in the country. 8.35 Then people went out to see what had happened, and they came to Jesus, and found the man from whom the demons had gone, sitting at the feet of Jesus, clothed and in his right mind; and they were afraid. 8.36 And those who had seen it told them how he who had been possessed with demons was healed. 8.37 Then all the people of the surrounding country of the Ger'asenes asked him to depart from them; for they were seized with great fear; so he got into the boat and returned. 8.38 The man from whom the demons had gone begged that he might be with him; but he sent him away, saying, 8.39 "Return to your home, and declare how much God has done for you." And he went away, proclaiming throughout the whole city how much Jesus had done for him.

Jairus' Daughter / a Woman's Faith

5.21 And when Jesus had crossed again in the boat to the other side, a great crowd gathered about him; and he was beside the sea. 5.22 Then came one of the rulers of the synagogue, Ja'irus by name; and seeing him, he fell at his feet, 5.23 and besought him, saying, "My little daughter is at the point of death. Come and lay your hands on her, so that she may be made well, and live." 5.24 And he went with him. And a great crowd followed him and thronged about him. 5.25 And there was a woman who had had a flow of blood for twelve years, 5.26 and who had suffered much under many physicians, and had spent all that she had, and was no better but rather grew worse. 5.27 She had heard the reports about Jesus, and came up behind him in the crowd and touched his garment. 5.28 For she said, "If I touch even his garments, I shall be made well." 5.29 And immediately the hemorrhage ceased; and she felt in her body that she was healed of her disease. 5.30 And Jesus, perceiving in himself that power had gone forth from him, immediately turned about in the crowd, and said, "Who touched my garments?" 5.31 And his disciples said to him, "You see the crowd pressing around you, and yet you say, 'Who touched me?'" 5.32 And he looked around to see who had done it. 5.33 But the woman, knowing what had been done to her, came in fear and trembling and fell down before him, and told him the whole truth. 5.34 And he said to her, "Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace, and be healed of your disease." 5.35 While he was still speaking, there came from the ruler's house some who said, "Your daughter is dead. Why trouble the Teacher any further?" 5.36 But ignoring what they said, Jesus said to the ruler of the synagogue, "Do not fear, only believe." 5.37 And he allowed no one to follow him except Peter and James and John the brother of James. 5.38 When they came to the house of the ruler of the synagogue, he saw a tumult, and people weeping and wailing loudly.

Jairus' Daughter / a Woman's Faith

9.18 While he was thus speaking to them, behold, a ruler came in and knelt before him, saying, "My daughter has just died; but come and lay your hand on her, and she will live." 9.19 And Jesus rose and followed him, with his disciples. 9.20 And behold, a woman who had suffered from a hemorrhage for twelve years came up behind him and touched the fringe of his garment; 9.21 for she said to herself, "If I only touch his garment, I shall be made well." 9.22 Jesus turned, and seeing her he said, "Take heart, daughter; your faith has made you well." And instantly the woman was made well. 9.23 And when Jesus came to the ruler's house, and saw the flute players, and the crowd making a tumult, 9.24 he said, "Depart; for the girl is not dead but sleeping." And they laughed at him. 9.25 But when the crowd had been put outside, he went in and took her by the hand, and the girl arose. 9.26 And the report of this went through all that district.

8.40 Now when Jesus returned, the crowd welcomed him, for they were all waiting for him. 8.41 And there came a man named Ja'irus, who was a ruler of the synagogue; and falling at Jesus' feet he besought him to come to his house, 8.42 for he had an only daughter, about twelve years of age, and she was dying. As he went, the people pressed round him. 8.43 And a woman who had had a flow of blood for twelve years and could not be healed by any one, 8.44 came up behind him, and touched the fringe of his garment; and immediately her flow of blood ceased. 8.45 And Jesus said, "Who was it that touched me?" When all denied it, Peter said, "Master, the multitudes surround you and press upon you!" 8.46 But Jesus said, "Some one touched me; for I perceive that power has gone forth from me." 8.47 And when the woman saw that she was not hidden, she came trembling, and falling down before him declared in the presence of all the people why she had touched him, and how she had been immediately healed. 8.48 And he said to her, "Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace." 8.49 While he was still speaking, a man from the ruler's house came and said, "Your daughter is dead; do not trouble the Teacher any more." 8.50 But Jesus on hearing this answered him, "Do not fear; only believe, and she shall be well." 8.51 And when he came to the house, he permitted no one to enter with him, except Peter and John and James, and the father and mother of the child. 8.52 And all were weeping and bewailing her; but he said, "Do not weep; for she is not dead but sleeping." 8.53 And they laughed at him, knowing that she was dead. 8.54 But taking her by the hand he called, saying, "Child, arise." 8.55 And her spirit returned, and she got up at once; and he directed that something should be given her to eat.

5.39 And when he had entered, he said to them, "Why do you make a tumult and weep? The child is not dead but sleeping." 5.40 And they laughed at him. But he put them all outside, and took the child's father and mother and those who were with him, and went in where the child was. 5.41 Taking her by the hand he said to her, "Tal'itha cu'mi"; which means, "Little girl, I say to you, arise." 5.42 And immediately the girl got up and walked (she was twelve years of age), and they were immediately overcome with amazement. 5.43 And he strictly charged them that no one should know this, and told them to give her something to eat.

Leaving Galilee

13.31 At that very hour some Pharisees came, and said to him, "Get away from here, for Herod wants to kill you." 13.32 And he said to them, "Go and tell that fox, 'Behold, I cast out demons and perform cures today and tomorrow, and the third day I finish my course. 13.33 Nevertheless I must go on my way today and tomorrow and the day following; for it cannot be that a prophet should perish away from Jerusalem.'

Healing a Man with Dropsy

14.1 One sabbath when he went to dine at the house of a ruler who belonged to the Pharisees, they were watching him. 14.2 And behold, there was a man before him who had dropsy. 14.3 And Jesus spoke to the lawyers and Pharisees, saying, "Is it lawful to heal on the sabbath, or not?" 14.4 But they were silent. Then he took him and healed him, and let him go. 14.5 And he said to them, "Which of you, having a son or an ox that has fallen into a well, will not immediately pull him out on a sabbath day?" 14.6 And they could not reply to this.

Interpretation of the Parable of the Weeds

13.36 Then he left the crowds and went into the house. And his disciples came to him, saying, "Explain to us the parable of the weeds of the field." 13.37 He answered, "He who sows the good seed is the Son of man; 13.38 the field is the world, and the good seed means the sons of the kingdom; the weeds are the sons of the evil one, 13.39 and the enemy who sowed them is the devil; the harvest is the close of the age, and the reapers are angels. 13.40 Just as the weeds are gathered and burned with fire, so will it be at the close of the age. 13.41 The Son of man will send his angels, and they will gather out of his kingdom all causes of sin and all evildoers, 13.42 and throw them into the furnace of fire; there men will weep and gnash their teeth. 13.43 Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. He who has ears, let him hear.

The Parable of the Hidden Treasure

13.44."The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field, which a man found and covered up; then in his joy he goes and sells all that he has and buys that field

The Parable of the Pearl

13.45 "Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant in search of fine pearls, 13.46 who, on finding one pearl of great value, went and sold all that he had and bought it.

The Parable of the Net

13.47 "Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a net which was thrown into the sea and gathered fish of every kind; 13.48 when it was full, men drew it ashore and sat down and sorted the good into vessels but threw away the bad. 13.49 So it will be at the close of the age. The angels will come out and separate the evil from the righteous, 13.50 and throw them into the furnace of fire; there men will weep and gnash their teeth.

13.51 "Have you understood all this?" Teaching on Humility

14.7 Now he told a parable to those who were invited, when he marked how they chose the places of honor, saying to them, 14.8 " When you are invited by any one to a marriage feast, do not sit down in a place of honor, lest a more eminent man than you be invited by him; 14.9 and he who invited you both will come and say to you, 'Give place to this man,' and then you will begin with shame to take the lowest place. 14.10 But when you are invited, go and sit in the lowest place, so that when your host comes he may say to you, 'Friend, go up higher'; then you will be honored in the presence of all who sit at table with you. 14.11 For every one who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted." 14.12 He said also to the man who had invited him, "When you give a dinner or a banquet, do not invite your friends or your brothers or your kinsmen or rich neighbors, lest they also invite you in return, and you be repaid. 14.13 But when you give a feast, invite the poor, the maimed, the lame, the blind, 14.14 and you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you. You will be repaid at the resurrection of the just."

Rejection at Nazareth

13.54 and coming to his own country he taught them in their synagogue, so that they were astonished, and said, "Where did this man get this wisdom and these mighty works? 13.55 Is not this the carpenter's son? Is not his mother called Mary? And are not his brothers James and Joseph and Simon and Judas? 13.56 And are not all his sisters with us? Where then did this man get all this?" 13.57 And they took offense at him. But Jesus said to them, "A prophet is not without honor except in his own country and in his own house." 13.58 And he did not do many mighty works there, because of their unbelief.

LUKE

Rejection at Nazareth

4.16 And he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up; and he went to the synagogue, as his custom was, on the sabbath day. And he stood up to read; 4.17 and there was given to him the book of the prophet Isaiah. He opened the book and found the place where it was written, 4.18 "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to preach good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed, 4.19 to proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord." 4.20 And he closed the book, and gave it back to the attendant, and sat down; and the eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. 4.21 And he began to say to them, "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing." 4.22 And all spoke well of him, and wondered at the gracious words which proceeded out of his mouth; and they said, "Is not this Joseph's son?" 4.23 And he said to them, "Doubtless you will quote to me this proverb, 'Physician, heal yourself; what we have heard you did at Caper'na-um, do here also in your own country.'" 4.24 And he said, "Truly, I say to you, no prophet is acceptable in his own country. 4.25 But in truth, I tell you, there were many widows in Israel in the days of Eli'jah, when the heaven was shut up three years and six months, when there came a great famine over all the land; 4.26 and Eli'jah was sent to none of them but only to Zar'ephath, in the land of Sidon, to a woman who was a widow. 4.27 And there were many lepers in Israel in the time of the prophet Eli'sha; and none of them was cleansed, but only Na'aman the Syrian." 4.28 When they heard this, all in the synagogue were filled with wrath. 4.29 And they rose up and put him out of the city, and led him to the brow of the hill on which their city was built, that they might throw him down headlong. 4.30 But passing through the midst of them he went away.

After the two days he departed to Galilee. 4.44 For Jesus himself testified that a prophet has no honor in his own country.

Sending Out the Twelve

6.6 And he marveled because of their unbelief. And he went about among the villages teaching. 6.7 And he called to him the twelve, and began to send them out two by two, and gave them authority over the unclean spirits.

6.8 He charged them to take nothing for their journey except a staff; no bread, no bag, no money in their belts;

6.9 but to wear sandals and not put on two tunics.

6.10 And he said to them, "Where you enter a house, stay there until you leave the place. 6.11 And if any place will not receive you and they refuse to hear you, when you

leave, shake off the dust that is on your feet for a testimony against them." 6.12 So they went out and preached that men should repent. 6.13 And they cast out many demons, and anointed with oil many that were sick and healed them.

Herod's Understanding of Jesus

6.14 King Herod heard of it; for Jesus' name had become known. Some said, "John the baptizer has been raised from the dead; that is why these powers are at work in him." 6.15 But others said, "It is Eli'jah." And others said, "It is a prophet, like one of the prophets of old." 6.16 But when Herod heard of it he said, "John, whom I beheaded, has been raised."

Sending Out the Twelve/Seventy

9.35 And Jesus went about all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues and preaching the gospel of the kingdom, and healing every disease and every infirmity

9.36 When he saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. 9.37 Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; 9.38 pray therefore the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest."

14.1 At that time Herod the tetrarch heard about the fame of Jesus;

14.2 and he said to his servants, "This is John the Baptist, he has been raised from the dead; that is why these powers are at work in him."

Herod's Understanding of Jesus

9.7 Now Herod the tetrarch heard of all that was done, and he was perplexed, because it was said by some that John had been raised from the dead, 9.8 by some that Eli'jah had appeared, and by others that one of the old prophets had risen. 9.9 Herod said, "John I beheaded; but who is this about whom I hear such things?" And he sought to see him.

The Death of John

6.17For Herod had sent and seized John, and bound him in prison for the sake of Hero'di-as, his brother Philip's wife; because he had married her. 6.18For John said to Herod, "It is not lawful for you to have your brother's wife." 6.19And Hero'di-as had a grudge against him, and wanted to kill him. But she could not, 6.20for Herod feared John, knowing that he was a righteous and holy man, and kept him safe. When he heard him, he was much perplexed; and yet he heard him gladly. 6.21But an opportunity came when Herod on his birthday gave a banquet for his courtiers and officers and the leading men of Galilee. 6.22For when Hero'di-as' daughter came in and danced, she pleased Herod and his guests; and the king said to the girl, "Ask me for whatever you wish, and I will grant it." 6.23And he vowed to her, "Whatever you ask me, I will give you, even half of my kingdom." 6.24And she went out, and said to her mother, "What shall I ask?" And she said, "The head of John the baptizer." 6.25And she came in immediately with haste to the king, and asked, saying, "I want you to give me at once the head of John the Baptist on a platter." 6.26And the king was exceedingly sorry; but because of his oaths and his guests he did not want to break his word to her. 6.27And immediately the king sent a soldier of the guard and gave orders to bring his head. He went and beheaded him in the prison, 6.28and brought his head on a platter, and gave it to the girl; and the girl gave it to her mother. 6.29When his disciples heard of it, they came and took his body, and laid it in a tomb.

And many such things you do." 7.14 And he called the people to him again, and said to them, "Hear me, all of you, and understand: 7.15 there is nothing outside a man which by going into him can defile him; but the things which come out of a man are what defile him." 7.16 7.17 And when he had entered the house, and left the people, his disciples asked him about the parable. 7.18 And he said to them, "Then are you also without understanding? 9.18 Now it happened that as he was praying alone the disciples were with him; and he asked them, "Who do the people say that I am?" 9.19 And they answered, "John the Baptist; but others say, Eli'jah; and others, that one of the old prophets has risen." 9.20 And he said to them, "But who do you say that I am?" And Peter answered, "The Christ of God." 9.21 But he charged and commanded them to tell this to no one, 9.22 saying, "The Son of man must suffer many things, and be rejected by the elders and chief priests and scribes, and be killed, and on the third day be raised."

19.1 Now when Jesus had finished these sayings, he went away from Galilee and entered the region of Judea beyond the Jordan; 19.2 and large crowds followed him, and he healed them there. 19.3 And Pharisees came up to him and tested him by asking, "Is it lawful to divorce one's wife for any cause?" 19.4 He answered, "Have you not read that he who made them from the beginning made them male and female, 19.5 and said, 'For this reason a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh'? 19.6 So they are no longer two but one flesh. What therefore God has joined together, let not man put asunder." 19.7 They said to him, "Why then did Moses command one to give a certificate of divorce, and to put her away?" 19.8 He said to them, "For your hardness of heart Moses allowed you to divorce your wives, but from the beginning it was not so. 19.9 And I say to you: whoever divorces his wife, except for unchastity, and marries another, commits adultery." 19.10 The disciples said to him, "If such is the case of a man with his wife, it is not expedient to marry." 19.11 But he said to them, "Not all men can receive this saying, but only those to whom it is given. 19.12 For there are eunuchs who have been so from birth, and there are eunuchs who have been made eunuchs by men, and there are eunuchs who have made themselves eunuchs for the sake of the kingdom of heaven. He who is able to receive this, let him receive it."

On Divorce

5.31 "It was also said, 'Whoever divorces his wife, let him give her a certificate of divorce.' 5.32 But I say to you that every one who divorces his wife, except on the ground of unchastity, makes her an adulteress; and whoever marries a divorced woman commits adultery

Where are the nine? 17.18 Was no one found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?" 17.19 And he said to him, "Rise and go your way; your faith has made you well."

17.20 Being asked by the Pharisees when the kingdom of God was coming, he answered them, "The kingdom of God is not coming with signs to be observed; 17.21 nor will they say, 'Lo, here it is!' or 'There!' for behold, the kingdom of God is in the midst of you."

The Parable of the Labourers in the Vineyard

20.1. "For the kingdom of heaven is like a householder who went out early in the morning to hire laborers for his vineyard

20.2 After agreeing with the laborers for a denarius a day, he sent them into his vineyard. 20.3 And going out about the third hour he saw others standing idle in the market place; 20.4 and to them he said, 'You go into the vineyard too, and whatever is right I will give you.' So they went. 20.5 Going out again about the sixth hour and the ninth hour, he did the same. 20.6 And about the eleventh hour he went out and found others standing; and he said to them, 'Why do you stand here idle all day?' 20.7 They said to him, 'Because no one has hired us.' He said to them, 'You go into the vineyard too.' 20.8 And when evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his steward, 'Call the laborers and pay them their wages, beginning with the last, up to the first.' 20.9 And when those hired about the eleventh hour came, each of them received a denarius. 20.10 Now when the first came, they thought they would receive more; but each of them also received a denarius. 20.11 And on receiving it they grumbled at the householder, 20.12 saying, 'These last worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us who have borne the burden of the day and the scorching heat.' 20.13 But he replied to one of them, 'Friend, I am doing you no wrong; did you not agree with me for a denarius? 20.14 Take what belongs to you, and go; I choose to give to this last as I give to you. 20.15 Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or do you begrudge my generosity?' 20.16 So the last will be first, and the first last."

19.39 And some of the Pharisees in the multitude said to him, "Teacher, rebuke your disciples." 19.40 He answered, "I tell you, if these were silent, the very stones would cry out." 19.41 And when he drew near and saw the city he wept over it, 19.42 saying, "Would that even today you knew the things that make for peace! But now they are hid from your eyes. 19.43 For the days shall come upon you, when your enemies will cast up a bank about you and surround you, and hem you in on every side, 19.44 and dash you to the ground, you and your children within you, and they will not leave one stone upon another in you; because you did not know the time of your visitation."

23.22 and he who swears by heaven, swears by the throne of God and by him who sits upon it. 23.23 "Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! for you tithe mint and dill and cummin, and have neglected the weightier matters of the law, justice and mercy and faith; these you ought to have done, without neglecting the others. 23.24 You blind guides, straining out a gnat and swallowing a camel!

Against the Pharisees

23.25 "Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! for you cleanse the outside of the cup and of the plate, but inside they are full of extortion and rapacity. 23.26 You blind Pharisee! first cleanse the inside of the cup and of the plate, that the outside also may be clean. 23.27 "Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! for you are like whitewashed tombs, which outwardly appear beautiful, but within they are full of dead men's bones and all uncleanness. 23.28 So you also outwardly appear righteous to men, but within you are full of hypocrisy and iniquity. 23.29 "Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! for you build the tombs of the prophets and adorn the monuments of the righteous, 23.30 saying, 'If we had lived in the days of our fathers, we would not have taken part with them in shedding the blood of the prophets.' 23.31 Thus you witness against yourselves, that you are sons of those who murdered the prophets. 23.32 Fill up, then, the measure of your fathers. 23.33 You serpents, you brood of vipers, how are you to escape being sentenced to hell? 23.34 Therefore I send you prophets and wise men and scribes, some of whom you will kill and crucify, and some you will scourge in your synagogues and persecute from town to town, 23.35 that upon you may come all the righteous blood shed on earth, from the blood of innocent Abel to the blood of Zechari'ah the son of Barachi'ah, whom you murdered between the sanctuary and the altar. 23.36 Truly, I say to you, all this will come upon this generation.

Yes, I tell you, it shall be required of this generation. 11.52 Woe to you lawyers! for you have taken away the key of knowledge; you did not enter yourselves, and you hindered those who were entering." 11.53 As he went away from there, the scribes and the Pharisees began to press him hard, and to provoke him to speak of many things, 11.54 lying in wait for him, to catch at something he might say.

25.34 Then the King will say to those at his right hand, 'Come, O blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; 25.35 for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, 25.36 I was naked and you clothed me, I was sick and you visited me, I was in prison and you came to me.'

25.37 Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when did we see thee hungry and feed thee, or thirsty and give thee drink? 25.38 And when did we see thee a stranger and welcome thee, or naked and clothe thee? 25.39 And when did we see thee sick or in prison and visit thee?'

25.40 And the King will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to me.' 25.41 Then he will say to those at his left hand, 'Depart from me, you cursed, into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels; 25.42 for I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me no drink, 25.43 I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not clothe me, sick and in prison and you did not visit me.'

25.44 Then they also will answer, 'Lord, when did we see thee hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not minister to thee?' 25.45 Then he will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it not to one of the least of these, you did it not to me.' 25.46 And they will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life."

And he answered, "What is it, Teacher?" 7.41 "A certain creditor had two debtors; one owed five hundred denarii, and the other fifty. 7.42 When they could not pay, he forgave them both. Now which of them will love him more?" 7.43 Simon answered, "The one, I suppose, to whom he forgave more." And he said to him, "You have judged rightly." 7.44 Then turning toward the woman he said to Simon, "Do you see this woman? I entered your house, you gave me no water for my feet, but she has wet my feet with her tears and wiped them with her hair. 7.45 You gave me no kiss, but from the time I came in she has not ceased to kiss my feet. 7.46 You did not anoint my head with oil, but she has anointed my feet with ointment. 7.47 Therefore I tell you, her sins, which are many, are forgiven, for she loved much; but he who is forgiven little, loves little." 7.48 And he said to her, "Your sins are forgiven." 7.49 Then those who were at table with him began to say among themselves, "Who is this, who even forgives sins?" 7.50 And he said to the woman, "Your faith has saved you; go in peace."

Behold, the hour is at hand, and the Son of man is betrayed into the hands of sinners. 26.46 Rise, let us be going; see, my betrayer is at hand."

The slave's name was Malchus. 18.11 Jesus said to Peter, "Put your sword into its sheath; shall I not drink the cup which the Father has given me?" 18.12 So the band of soldiers and their captain and the officers of the Jews seized Jesus and bound him.

14.53 And they led Jesus to the high priest; and all the chief priests and the elders and the scribes were assembled. 14.54 And Peter had followed him at a distance, right into the courtyard of the high priest; and he was sitting with the guards, and warming himself at the fire. 14.55 Now the chief priests and the whole council sought testimony against Jesus to put him to death; but they found none. 14.56 For many bore false witness against him, and their witness did not agree. 14.57 And some stood up and bore false witness against him, saying, 14.58 "We heard him say, 'I will destroy this temple that is made with hands, and in three days I will build another, not made with hands.'" 14.59 Yet not even so did their testimony agree. 14.60 And the high priest stood up in the midst, and asked Jesus, "Have you no answer to make? And the guards received him with blows. 14.66 And as Peter was below in the courtyard, one of the maids of the high priest came; 14.67 and seeing Peter warming himself, she looked at him, and said, "You also were with the Nazarene, Jesus." 14.68 But he denied it, saying, "I neither know nor understand what you mean." And he went out into the gateway. 14.69 And the maid saw him, and began again to say to the bystanders, "This man is one of them."

26.57 Then those who had seized Jesus led him to Ca'iaphas the high priest, where the scribes and the elders had gathered. 26.58 But Peter followed him at a distance, as far as the courtyard of the high priest, and going inside he sat with the guards to see the end. 26.59 Now the chief priests and the whole council sought false testimony against Jesus that they might put him to death, 26.60 but they found none, though many false witnesses came forward. Who is it that struck you?" 26.69 Now Peter was sitting outside in the courtyard. And a maid came up to him, and said, "You also were with Jesus the Galilean." 26.70 But he denied it before them all, saying, "I do not know what you mean." 26.71 And when he went out to the porch, another maid saw him, and she said to the bystanders, "This man was with Jesus of Nazareth." 26.72 And again he denied it with an oath, "I do not know the man."

Peter followed at a distance; 22.55 and when they had kindled a fire in the middle of the courtyard and sat down together, Peter sat among them. 22.56 Then a maid, seeing him as he sat in the light and gazing at him, said, "This man also was with him." 22.57 But he denied it, saying, "Woman, I do not know him." 22.58 And a little later some one else saw him and said, "You also are one of them." But Peter said, "Man, I am not." 22.59 And after an interval of about an hour still another insisted, saying, "Certainly this man also was with him; for he is a Galilean." 22.60 But Peter said, "Man, I do not know what you are saying." And immediately, while he was still speaking, the cock crowed. 22.61 And the Lord turned and looked at Peter. And Peter remembered the word of the Lord, how he had said to him, "Before the cock crows today, you will deny me three times." 22.62 And he went out and wept bitterly. 22.63 Now the men who were holding Jesus mocked him and beat him; 22.64 they also blindfolded him and asked him, "Prophesy! Who is it that struck you?" 22.65 And they spoke many other words against him, reviling him. 22.66 When day came, the assembly of the elders of the people gathered together, both chief priests and scribes; and they led him away to their council, and they said, 22.67 "If you are the Christ, tell us." But he said to them, "If I tell you, you will not believe; 22.68 and if I ask you, you will not answer. 22.69 But from now on the Son of man shall be seated at the right hand of the power of God." 22.70 And they all said, "Are you the Son of God, then?" And he said to them, "You say that I am." 22.71 And they said, "What further testimony do we need? We have heard it ourselves from his own lips."

Jesus before the Sanhedrin. Peter's Denial

18.13 First they led him to Annas; for he was the father-in-law of Ca'iaphas, who was high priest that year. 18.14 It was Ca'iaphas who had given counsel to the Jews that it was expedient that one man should die for the people. 18.15 Simon Peter followed Jesus, and so did another disciple. As this disciple was known to the high priest, he entered the court of the high priest along with Jesus, 18.16 while Peter stood outside at the door. So the other disciple, who was known to the high priest, went out and spoke to the maid who kept the door, and brought Peter in. 18.17 The maid who kept the door said to Peter, "Are not you also one of this man's disciples?" He said, "I am not." 18.18 Now the servants and officers had made a charcoal fire, because it was cold, and they were standing and warming themselves; Peter also was with them, standing and warming himself. 18.19 The high priest then questioned Jesus about his disciples and his teaching. 18.20 Jesus answered him, "I have spoken openly to the world; I have always taught in synagogues and in the temple, where all Jews come together; I have said nothing secretly. 18.21 Why do you ask me? Ask those who have heard me, what I said to them; they know what I said." 18.22 When he had said this, one of the officers standing by struck Jesus with his hand, saying, "Is that how you answer the high priest?" 18.23 Jesus answered him, "If I have spoken wrongly, bear witness to the wrong; but if I have spoken rightly, why do you strike me?" 18.24 Annas then sent him bound to Ca'iaphas the high priest. 18.25 Now Simon Peter was standing and warming himself. They said to him, "Are not you also one of his disciples?" He denied it and said, "I am not." 18.26 One of the servants of the high priest, a kinsman of the man whose ear Peter had cut off, asked, "Did I not see you in the garden with him?" 18.27 Peter again denied it; and at once the cock crowed.

14.70 But again he denied it. And after a little while again the bystanders said to Peter, "Certainly you are one of them; for you are a Galilean." 14.71 But he began to invoke a curse on himself and to swear, "I do not know this man of whom you speak." 14.72 And immediately the cock crowed a second time. And Peter remembered how Jesus had said to him, "Before the cock crows twice, you will deny me three times." And he broke down and wept.

Jesus Delivered to Pilate

15.1 And as soon as it was morning the chief priests, with the elders and scribes, and the whole council held a consultation; and they bound Jesus and led him away and delivered him to Pilate.

26.73 After a little while the bystanders came up and said to Peter, "Certainly you are also one of them, for your accent betrays you." 26.74 Then he began to invoke a curse on himself and to swear, "I do not know the man." And immediately the cock crowed. 26.75 And Peter remembered the saying of Jesus, "Before the cock crows, you will deny me three times." And he went out and wept bitterly.

Jesus Delivered to Pilate

27.1 When morning came, all the chief priests and the elders of the people took counsel against Jesus to put him to death;
27.2 and they bound him and led him away and delivered him to Pilate the governor.

The Death of Judas

cf. Acts 1.18-19

27.3 When Judas, his betrayer, saw that he was condemned, he repented and brought back the thirty pieces of silver to the chief priests and the elders, 27.4 saying, "I have sinned in betraying innocent blood." They said, "What is that to us? See to it yourself." 27.5 And throwing down the pieces of silver in the temple, he departed; and he went and hanged himself. 27.6 But the chief priests, taking the pieces of silver, said, "It is not lawful to put them into the treasury, since they are blood money." 27.7 So they took counsel, and bought with them the potter's field, to bury strangers in. 27.8 Therefore that field has been called the Field of Blood to this day. 27.9 Then was fulfilled what had been spoken by the prophet Jeremiah, saying, "And they took the thirty pieces of silver, the price of him on whom a price had been set by some of the sons of Israel, 27.10 and they gave them for the potter's field, as the Lord directed me."

Jesus Delivered to Pilate

23.1 Then the whole company of them arose, and brought him before Pilate.

Jesus Delivered to Pilate

18.28 Then they led Jesus from the house of Ca'iaphas to the praetorium. It was early. They themselves did not enter the praetorium, so that they might not be defiled, but might eat the passover.

The Trial before Pilate

15.2 And Pilate asked him, "Are you the King of the Jews?" And he answered him, "You have said so."

15.3 And the chief priests accused him of many things.

15.4 And Pilate again asked him, "Have you no answer to make? See how many charges they bring against you."

15.5 But Jesus made no further answer, so that Pilate wondered.

The Trial before Pilate

27.11 Now Jesus stood before the governor; and the governor asked him, "Are you the King of the Jews?"

Jesus said, "You have said so."

27.12 But when he was accused by the chief priests and elders, he made no answer. 27.13 Then Pilate said to him, "Do you not hear how many things they testify against you?" 27.14 But he gave him no answer, not even to a single charge; so that the governor wondered greatly.

23.2 And they began to accuse him, saying, "We found this man perverting our nation, and forbidding us to give tribute to Caesar, and saying that he himself is Christ a king." 23.3 And Pilate asked him, "Are you the King of the Jews?" And he answered him, "You have said so."

23.4 And Pilate said to the chief priests and the multitudes, "I find no crime in this man." 23.5 But they were urgent, saying, "He stirs up the people, teaching throughout all Judea, from Galilee even to this place." 23.6 When Pilate heard this, he asked whether the man was a Galilean. 23.7 And when he learned that he belonged to Herod's jurisdiction, he sent him over to Herod, who was himself in Jerusalem at that time.

Jesus Before Herod

23.8 When Herod saw Jesus, he was very glad, for he had long desired to see him, because he had heard about him, and he was hoping to see some sign done by him. 23.9 So he questioned him at some length; but he made no answer. 23.10 The chief priests and the scribes stood by, vehemently accusing him. 23.11 And Herod with his soldiers treated him with contempt and mocked him; then, arraying him in gorgeous apparel, he sent him back to Pilate. 23.12 And Herod and Pilate became friends with each other that very day, for before this they had been at enmity with each other. 23.13 Pilate then called together the chief priests and the rulers and the people, 23.14 and said to them, "You brought me this man as one who was perverting the people; and after examining him before you, behold, I did not find this man guilty of any of your charges against him; 23.15 neither did Herod, for he sent him back to us. Behold, nothing deserving death has been done by him; 23.16 I will therefore chastise him and release him."

18.29 So Pilate went out to them and said, "What accusation do you bring against this man?" 18.30 They answered him, "If this man were not an evildoer, we would not have handed him over." 18.31 Pilate said to them, "Take him yourselves and judge him by your own law." The Jews said to him, "It is not lawful for us to put any man to death." 18.32 This was to fulfil the word which Jesus had spoken to show by what death he was to die. 18.33 Pilate entered the praetorium again and called Jesus, and said to him, "Are you the King of the Jews?" 18.34 Jesus answered, "Do you say this of your own accord, or did others say it to you about me?" 18.35 Pilate answered, "Am I a Jew? Your own nation and the chief priests have handed you over to me; what have you done?" 18.36 Jesus answered, "My kingship is not of this world; if my kingship were of this world, my servants would fight, that I might not be handed over to the Jews; but my kingship is not from the world." 18.37 Pilate said to him, "So you are a king?" Jesus answered, "You say that I am a king. For this I was born, and for this I have come into the world, to bear witness to the truth. Every one who is of the truth hears my voice." 18.38 Pilate said to him, "What is truth?" After he had said this, he went out to the Jews again, and told them, "I find no crime in him."

15.6 Now at the feast he used to release for them one prisoner for whom they asked. 15.7 And among the rebels in prison, who had committed murder in the insurrection, there was a man called Barab'bas. 15.8 And the crowd came up and began to ask Pilate to do as he was wont to do for them. 15.9 And he answered them, "Do you want me to release for you the King of the Jews?" 15.10 For he perceived that it was out of envy that the chief priests had delivered him up. 15.11 But the chief priests stirred up the crowd to have him release for them Barab'bas instead. 15.12 And Pilate again said to them, "Then what shall I do with the man whom you call the King of the Jews?" 15.13 And they cried out again, "Crucify him." 15.14 And Pilate said to them, "Why, what evil has he done?" 27.15 Now at the feast the governor was accustomed to release for the crowd any one prisoner whom they wanted. 27.16 And they had then a notorious prisoner, called Barab'bas. 27.17 So when they had gathered, Pilate said to them, "Whom do you want me to release for you, Barab'bas or Jesus who is called Christ?" 27.18 For he knew that it was out of envy that they had delivered him up. 27.19 Besides, while he was sitting on the judgment seat, his wife sent word to him, "Have nothing to do with that righteous man, for I have suffered much over him today in a dream." 27.20 Now the chief priests and the elders persuaded the people to ask for Barab'bas and destroy Jesus. 27.21 The governor again said to them, "Which of the two do you want me to release for you?" And they said, "Barab'bas." 27.22 Pilate said to them, "Then what shall I do with Jesus who is called Christ?" They all said, "Let him be crucified." 27.23 And he said, "Why, what evil has he done?" But they shouted all the more, "Let him be crucified." 27.24 So when Pilate saw that he was gaining nothing, but rather that a riot was beginning, he took water and washed his hands before the crowd, saying, "I am innocent of this man's blood; see to it yourselves." 27.25 And all the people answered, "His blood be on us and on our children!" 27.26 Then he released for them Barab'bas, and having scourged Jesus, delivered him to be crucified.

The Sentence of Death

23.17 23.18 But they all cried out together, "Away with this man, and release to us Barab'bas" -- 23.19 a man who had been thrown into prison for an insurrection started in the city, and for murder. 23.20 Pilate addressed them once more, desiring to release Jesus; 23.21 but they shouted out, "Crucify, crucify him!" 23.22 A third time he said to them, "Why, what evil has he done? I have found in him no crime deserving death; I will therefore chastise him and release him." 23.23 But they were urgent, demanding with loud cries that he should be crucified. And their voices prevailed. 23.24 So Pilate gave sentence that their demand should be granted. 23.25 He released the man who had been thrown into prison for insurrection and murder, whom they asked for; but Jesus he delivered up to their will.

18.39 But you have a custom that I should release one man for you at the Passover; will you have me release for you the King of the Jews?" 18.40 They cried out again, "Not this man, but Barab'bas!" Now Barab'bas was a robber.

15.16 And the soldiers led him away inside the palace (that is, the praetorium); and they called together the whole battalion. 15.17 And they clothed him in a purple cloak, and plaiting a crown of thorns they put it on him. 15.18 And they began to salute him, "Hail, King of the Jews!" 15.19 And they struck his head with a reed, and spat upon him, and they knelt down in homage to him. 15.20 And when they had mocked him, they stripped him of the purple cloak, and put his own clothes on him. And they led him out to crucify him.

The Mocking by Soldiers

27.27 Then the soldiers of the governor took Jesus into the praetorium, and they gathered the whole battalion before him. 27.28 And they stripped him and put a scarlet robe upon him, 27.29 and plaiting a crown of thorns they put it on his head, and put a reed in his right hand. And kneeling before him they mocked him, saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" 27.30 And they spat upon him, and took the reed and struck him on the head. 27.31 And when they had mocked him, they stripped him of the robe, and put his own clothes on him, and led him away to crucify him.

19.1 Then Pilate took Jesus and scourged him. 19.2 And the soldiers plaited a crown of thorns, and put it on his head, and arrayed him in a purple robe; 19.3 they came up to him, saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" and struck him with their hands. 19.4 Pilate went out again, and said to them, "See, I am bringing him out to you, that you may know that I find no crime in him." 19.5 So Jesus came out, wearing the crown of thorns and the purple robe. Pilate said to them, "Behold the man!" 19.6 When the chief priests and the officers saw him, they cried out, "Crucify him, crucify him!" Pilate said to them, "Take him yourselves and crucify him, for I find no crime in him." 19.7 The Jews answered him, "We have a law, and by that law he ought to die, because he has made himself the Son of God." 19.8 When Pilate heard these words, he was the more afraid; 19.9 he entered the praetorium again and said to Jesus, "Where are you from?" But Jesus gave no answer. 19.10 Pilate therefore said to him, "You will not speak to me? Do you not know that I have power to release you, and power to crucify you?" 19.11 Jesus answered him, "You would have no power over me unless it had been given you from above; therefore he who delivered me to you has the greater sin." 19.12 Upon this Pilate sought to release him, but the Jews cried out, "If you release this man, you are not Caesar's friend; every one who makes himself a king sets himself against Caesar." 19.13 When Pilate heard these words, he brought Jesus out and sat down on the judgment seat at a place called The Pavement, and in Hebrew, Gab'batha. 19.14 Now it was the day of Preparation of the Passover; it was about the sixth hour. He said to the Jews, "Behold your King!" 19.15 They cried out, "Away with him, away with him, crucify him!" Pilate said to them, "Shall I crucify your King?" The chief priests answered, "We have no king but Caesar."

19.16 Then he handed him over to them to be crucified

15.21 And they compelled a passer-by, Simon of Cyre'ne, who was coming in from the country, the father of Alexander and Rufus, to carry his cross.

15.22 And they brought him to the place called Gol'gotha (which means the place of a skull). 15.23 And they offered him wine mingled with myrrh; but he did not take it. 15.24 And they crucified him, and divided his garments among them, casting lots for them, to decide what each should take. 15.25 And it was the third hour, when they crucified him. 15.26 And the inscription of the charge against him read, "The King of the Jews." 15.27 And with him they crucified two robbers, one on his right and one on his left. 15.28 15.29 And those who passed by derided him, wagging their heads, and saying, "Aha! You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days, 15.30 save yourself, and come down from the cross!" 15.31 So also the chief priests mocked him to one another with the scribes, saying, "He saved others; he cannot save himself. 15.32 Let the Christ, the King of Israel, come down now from the cross, that we may see and believe." Those who were crucified with him also reviled him.

27.32 As they went out, they came upon a man of Cyre'ne, Simon by name; this man they compelled to carry his cross.

The Crucifixion

27.33 And when they came to a place called Gol'gotha (which means the place of a skull), 27.34 they offered him wine to drink, mingled with gall; but when he tasted it, he would not drink it. 27.35 And when they had crucified him, they divided his garments among them by casting lots; 27.36 then they sat down and kept watch over him there. 27.37 And over his head they put the charge against him, which read, "This is Jesus the King of the Jews." 27.38 Then two robbers were crucified with him, one on the right and one on the left. 27.39 And those who passed by derided him, wagging their heads 27.40 and saying, "You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days, save yourself! If you are the Son of God, come down from the cross." 27.41 So also the chief priests, with the scribes and elders, mocked him, saying, 27.42 "He saved others; he cannot save himself. He is the King of Israel; let him come down now from the cross, and we will believe in him. 27.43 He trusts in God; let God deliver him now, if he desires him; for he said, 'I am the Son of God.'" 27.44 And the robbers who were crucified with him also reviled him in the same way.

23.26 And as they led him away, they seized one Simon of Cyre'ne, who was coming in from the country, and laid on him the cross, to carry it behind Jesus. 23.27 And there followed him a great multitude of the people, and of women who bewailed and lamented him. 23.28 But Jesus turning to them said, "Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me, but weep for yourselves and for your children. 23.29 For behold, the days are coming when they will say, 'Blessed are the barren, and the wombs that never bore, and the breasts that never gave suck!' 23.30 Then they will begin to say to the mountains, 'Fall on us'; and to the hills, 'Cover us.' 23.31 For if they do this when the wood is green, what will happen when it is dry?" 23.32 Two others also, who were criminals, were led away to be put to death with him.

23.33 And when they came to the place which is called The Skull, there they crucified him, and the criminals, one on the right and one on the left. 23.34 And Jesus said, "Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do." And they cast lots to divide his garments. 23.35 And the people stood by, watching; but the rulers scoffed at him, saying, "He saved others; let him save himself, if he is the Christ of God, his Chosen One!" 23.36 The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him vinegar, 23.37 and saying, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" 23.38 There was also an inscription over him, "This is the King of the Jews." 23.39 One of the criminals who were hanged railed at him, saying, "Are you not the Christ? Save yourself and us!" 23.40 But the other rebuked him, saying, "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? 23.41 And we indeed justly; for we are receiving the due reward of our deeds; but this man has done nothing wrong." 23.42 And he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." 23.43 And he said to him, "Truly, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise."

The Crucifixion

19.17 So they took Jesus, and he went out, bearing his own cross, to the place called the place of a skull, which is called in Hebrew Gol'gotha. 19.18 There they crucified him, and with him two others, one on either side, and Jesus between them. 19.19 Pilate also wrote a title and put it on the cross; it read, "Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews." 19.20 Many of the Jews read this title, for the place where Jesus was crucified was near the city; and it was written in Hebrew, in Latin, and in Greek. 19.21 The chief priests of the Jews then said to Pilate, "Do not write, 'The King of the Jews,' but, 'This man said, I am King of the Jews.'" 19.22 Pilate answered, "What I have written I have written." 19.23 When the soldiers had crucified Jesus they took his garments and made four parts, one for each soldier; also his tunic. But the tunic was without seam, woven from top to bottom; 19.24 so they said to one another, "Let us not tear it, but cast lots for it to see whose it shall be." This was to fulfil the scripture, "They parted my garments among them, and for my clothing they cast lots." 19.25 So the soldiers did this. But standing by the cross of Jesus were his mother, and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Mag'dalene. 19.26 When Jesus saw his mother, and the disciple whom he loved standing near, he said to his mother, "Woman, behold, your son!" 19.27 Then he said to the disciple, "Behold, your mother!" And from that hour the disciple took her to his own home.

15.33 And when the sixth hour had come, there was darkness over the whole land until the ninth hour. 15.34 And at the ninth hour Jesus cried with a loud voice, "E'lo-i, E'lo-i, la'ma sabach-tha'ni?" which means, "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" 15.35 And some of the bystanders hearing it said, "Behold, he is calling Eli'jah." 15.36 And one ran and, filling a sponge full of vinegar, put it on a reed and gave it to him to drink, saying, "Wait, let us see whether Eli'jah will come to take him down." 15.37 And Jesus uttered a loud cry, and breathed his last. 15.38 And the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. 15.39 And when the centurion, who stood facing him, saw that he thus breathed his last, he said, "Truly this man was the Son of God!" 15.40 There were also women looking on from afar, among whom were Mary Mag'dalene, and Mary the mother of James the younger and of Joses, and Salo'me, 15.41 who, when he was in Galilee, followed him, and ministered to him; and also many other women who came up with him to Jerusalem.

27.45 Now from the sixth hour there was darkness over all the land until the ninth hour. 27.46 And about the ninth hour Jesus cried with a loud voice, "Eli, Eli, la'ma sabach-tha'ni?" that is, "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" 27.47 And some of the bystanders hearing it said, "This man is calling Eli'jah." 27.48 And one of them at once ran and took a sponge, filled it with vinegar, and put it on a reed, and gave it to him to drink. 27.49 But the others said, "Wait, let us see whether Eli'jah will come to save him." 27.50 And Jesus cried again with a loud voice and yielded up his spirit 27.51 And behold, the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom; and the earth shook, and the rocks were split; 27.52 the tombs also were opened, and many bodies of the saints who had fallen asleep were raised, 27.53 and coming out of the tombs after his resurrection they went into the holy city and appeared to many. 27.54 When the centurion and those who were with him, keeping watch over Jesus, saw the earthquake and what took place, they were filled with awe, and said, "Truly this was the Son of God!" 27.55 There were also many women there, looking on from afar, who had followed Jesus from Galilee, ministering to him; 27.56 among whom were Mary Mag'dalene, and Mary the mother of James and Joseph, and the mother of the sons of Zeb'edee.

23.44 It was now about the sixth hour, and there was darkness over the whole land until the ninth hour, 23.45 while the sun's light failed; and the curtain of the temple was torn in two. 23.46 Then Jesus, crying with a loud voice, said, "Father, into thy hands I commit my spirit!" And having said this he breathed his last. 23.47 Now when the centurion saw what had taken place, he praised God, and said, "Certainly this man was innocent!" 23.48 And all the multitudes who assembled to see the sight, when they saw what had taken place, returned home beating their breasts. 23.49 And all his acquaintances and the women who had followed him from Galilee stood at a distance and saw these things.

19.28 After this Jesus, knowing that all was now finished, said (to fulfil the scripture), "I thirst." 19.29 A bowl full of vinegar stood there; so they put a sponge full of the vinegar on hyssop and held it to his mouth. 19.30 When Jesus had received the vinegar, he said, "It is finished"; and he bowed his head and gave up his spirit. 19.31 Since it was the day of Preparation, in order to prevent the bodies from remaining on the cross on the sabbath (for that sabbath was a high day), the Jews asked Pilate that their legs might be broken, and that they might be taken away. 19.32 So the soldiers came and broke the legs of the first, and of the other who had been crucified with him; 19.33 but when they came to Jesus and saw that he was already dead, they did not break his legs. 19.34 But one of the soldiers pierced his side with a spear, and at once there came out blood and water. 19.35 He who saw it has borne witness--his testimony is true, and he knows that he tells the truth--that you also may believe. 19.36 For these things took place that the scripture might be fulfilled, "Not a bone of him shall be broken." 19.37 And again another scripture says, "They shall look on him whom they have pierced."

The Burial of Jesus

15.42 And when evening had come, since it was the day of Preparation, that is, the day before the sabbath, 15.43 Joseph of Arimathe'a, a respected member of the council, who was also himself looking for the kingdom of God, took courage and went to Pilate, and asked for the body of Jesus. 15.44 And Pilate wondered if he were already dead; and summoning the centurion, he asked him whether he was already dead. 15.45 And when he learned from the centurion that he was dead, he granted the body to Joseph. 15.46 And he bought a linen shroud, and taking him down, wrapped him in the linen shroud, and laid him in a tomb which had been hewn out of the rock; and he rolled a stone against the door of the tomb. 15.47 Mary Mag'dalene and Mary the mother of Joses saw where he was laid.

27.57 When it was evening, there came a rich man from Arimathe'a, named Joseph, who also was a disciple of Jesus 27.58 He went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. Then Pilate ordered it to be given to him. 27.59 And Joseph took the body, and wrapped it in a clean linen shroud, 27.60 and laid it in his own new tomb, which he had hewn in the rock; and he rolled a great stone to the door of the tomb, and departed. 27.61 Mary Mag'dalene and the other Mary were there, sitting opposite the sepulchre.

The Guard at the Tomb

27.62 Next day, that is, after the day of Preparation, the chief priests and the Pharisees gathered before Pilate 27.63 and said, "Sir, we remember how that impostor said, while he was still alive, 'After three days I will rise again.' 27.64 Therefore order the sepulchre to be made secure until the third day, lest his disciples go and steal him away, and tell the people, 'He has risen from the dead,' and the last fraud will be worse than the first." 27.65 Pilate said to them, "You have a guard of soldiers; go, make it as secure as you can." 27.66 So they went and made the sepulchre secure by sealing the stone and setting a guard.

The Burial of Jesus

23.50 Now there was a man named Joseph from the Jewish town of Arimathe'a. He was a member of the council, a good and righteous man, 23.51 who had not consented to their purpose and deed, and he was looking for the kingdom of God. 23.52 This man went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. 23.53 Then he took it down and wrapped it in a linen shroud, and laid him in a rock-hewn tomb, where no one had ever yet been laid. 23.54 It was the day of Preparation, and the sabbath was beginning. 23.55 The women who had come with him from Galilee followed, and saw the tomb, and how his body was laid; 23.56 then they returned, and prepared spices and ointments. On the sabbath they rested according to the commandment.

The Burial of Jesus

19.38 After this Joseph of Arimathe'a, who was a disciple of Jesus, but secretly, for fear of the Jews, asked Pilate that he might take away the body of Jesus, and Pilate gave him leave. So he came and took away his body. 19.39 Nicodemus also, who had at first come to him by night, came bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes, about a hundred pounds' weight. 19.40 They took the body of Jesus, and bound it in linen cloths with the spices, as is the burial custom of the Jews. 19.41 Now in the place where he was crucified there was a garden, and in the garden a new tomb where no one had ever been laid. 19.42 So because of the Jewish day of Preparation, as the tomb was close at hand, they laid Jesus there.

The Women at the Tomb

16.1 And when the sabbath was past, Mary Mag'dalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salo'me, bought spices, so that they might go and anoint him. 16.2 And very early on the first day of the week they went to the tomb when the sun had risen. 16.3 And they were saying to one another, "Who will roll away the stone for us from the door of the tomb?" 16.4 And looking up, they saw that the stone was rolled back; --it was very large. 16.5 And entering the tomb, they saw a young man sitting on the right side, dressed in a white robe; and they were amazed. 16.6 And he said to them, "Do not be amazed; you seek Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has risen, he is not here; see the place where they laid him. 16.7 But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going before you to Galilee; there you will see him, as he told you." 16.8 And they went out and fled from the tomb; for trembling and astonishment had come upon them; and they said nothing to any one, for they were afraid.

The Women at the Tomb

28.1 Now after the sabbath, toward the dawn of the first day of the week, Mary Mag'dalene and the other Mary went to see the sepulchre 28.2 And behold, there was a great earthquake; for an angel of the Lord descended from heaven and came and rolled back the stone, and sat upon it. 28.3 His appearance was like lightning, and his raiment white as snow. 28.4 And for fear of him the guards trembled and became like dead men. 28.5 But the angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid; for I know that you seek Jesus who was crucified. 28.6 He is not here; for he has risen, as he said. Come, see the place where he lay. 28.7 Then go quickly and tell his disciples that he has risen from the dead, and behold, he is going before you to Galilee; there you will see him. Lo, I have told you." 28.8 So they departed quickly from the tomb with fear and great joy, and ran to tell his disciples. 28.9 And behold, Jesus met them and said, "Hail!" And they came up and took hold of his feet and worshiped him. 28.10 Then Jesus said to them, "Do not be afraid; go and tell my brethren to go to Galilee, and there they will see me."

The Women at the Tomb

24.1 But on the first day of the week, at early dawn, they went to the tomb, taking the spices which they had prepared. 24.2 And they found the stone rolled away from the tomb, 24.3 but when they went in they did not find the body. 24.4 While they were perplexed about this, behold, two men stood by them in dazzling apparel; 24.5 and as they were frightened and bowed their faces to the ground, the men said to them, "Why do you seek the living among the dead? 24.6 Remember how he told you, while he was still in Galilee, 24.7 that the Son of man must be delivered into the hands of sinful men, and be crucified, and on the third day rise." 24.8 And they remembered his words, 24.9 and returning from the tomb they told all this to the eleven and to all the rest. 24.10 Now it was Mary Mag'dalene and Jo-an'na and Mary the mother of James and the other women with them who told this to the apostles; 24.11 but these words seemed to them an idle tale, and they did not believe them. 24.12

The Women at the Tomb

20.1 Now on the first day of the week Mary Mag'dalene came to the tomb early, while it was still dark, and saw that the stone had been taken away from the tomb. 20.2 So she ran, and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him." 20.3 Peter then came out with the other disciple, and they went toward the tomb. 20.4 They both ran, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first; 20.5 and stooping to look in, he saw the linen cloths lying there, but he did not go in. 20.6 Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb; he saw the linen cloths lying, 20.7 and the napkin, which had been on his head, not lying with the linen cloths but rolled up in a place by itself. 20.8 Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; 20.9 for as yet they did not know the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. 20.10 Then the disciples went back to their homes. 20.11 But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb, and as she wept she stooped to look into the tomb; 20.12 and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had lain, one at the head and one at the feet. 20.13 They said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "Because they have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." 20.14 Saying this, she turned round and saw Jesus standing, but she did not know that it was Jesus. 20.15 Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom do you seek?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." 20.16 Jesus said to her, "Mary." She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rab-bo'ni!" (which means Teacher). 20.17 Jesus said to her, "Do not hold me, for I have not yet ascended to the Father; but go to my brethren and say to them, I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." 20.18 Mary Mag'dalene went and said to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

The Longer Ending to Mark

Only Late MSS

16.9 Now when he rose early on the first day of the week, he appeared first to Mary Magdalene, from whom he had cast out seven demons. 16.10 She went and told those who had been with him, as they mourned and wept. 16.11 But when they heard that he was alive and had been seen by her, they would not believe it. 16.12 After this he appeared in another form to two of them, as they were walking into the country. 16.13 And they went back and told the rest, but they did not believe them. 16.14 Afterward he appeared to the eleven themselves as they sat at table; and he upbraided them for their unbelief and hardness of heart, because they had not believed those who saw him after he had risen. 16.15 And he said to them, "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to the whole creation. 16.16 He who believes and is baptized will be saved; but he who does not believe will be condemned. 16.17 And these signs will accompany those who believe: in my name they will cast out demons; they will speak in new tongues; 16.18 they will pick up serpents, and if they drink any deadly thing, it will not hurt them; they will lay their hands on the sick, and they will recover." 16.19 So then the Lord Jesus, after he had spoken to them, was taken up into heaven, and sat down at the right hand of God. 16.20 And they went forth and preached everywhere, while the Lord worked with them and confirmed the message by the signs that attended it. Amen.

Bribing the Soldiers

28.11 While they were going, behold, some of the guard went into the city and told the chief priests all that had taken place
28.12 And when they had assembled with the elders and taken counsel, they gave a sum of money to the soldiers
28.13 and said, "Tell people, 'His disciples came by night and stole him away while we were asleep.' 28.14 And if this comes to the governor's ears, we will satisfy him and keep you out of trouble." 28.15 So they took the money and did as they were directed; and this story has been spread among the Jews to this day.

The Command to Baptize

28.16 Now the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had directed them
28.17 And when they saw him they worshiped him; but some doubted
28.18 And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. 28.19 Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, 28.20 teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, to the close of the age."

The Road to Emmaus

24.13 That very day two of them were going to a village named Emma'us, about seven miles from Jerusalem,
24.14 and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. 24.15 While they were talking and discussing together, Jesus himself drew near and went with them. 24.16 But their eyes were kept from recognizing him. 24.17 And he said to them, "What is this conversation which you are holding with each other as you walk?" And they stood still, looking sad. 24.18 Then one of them, named Cle'opas, answered him, "Are you the only visitor to Jerusalem who does not know the things that have happened there in these days?" 24.19 And he said to them, "What things?" And they said to him, "Concerning Jesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, 24.20 and how our chief priests and rulers delivered him up to be condemned to death, and crucified him. 24.21 But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since this happened. 24.22 Moreover, some women of our company amazed us. They were at the tomb early in the morning 24.23 and did not find his body; and they came back saying that they had even seen a vision of angels, who said that he was alive. 24.24 Some of those who were with us went to the tomb, and found it just as the women had said; but him they did not see." 24.25 And he said to them, "O foolish men, and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken! 24.26 Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory?" 24.27 And beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them in all the scriptures the things concerning himself. 24.28 So they drew near to the village to which they were going. He appeared to be going further, 24.29 but they constrained him, saying, "Stay with us, for it is toward evening and the day is now far spent." So he went in to stay with them.

Jesus Appears to the Disciples

20.19 On the evening of that day, the first day of the week, the doors being shut where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you." 20.20 When he had said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples were glad when they saw the Lord. 20.21 Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, even so I send you." 20.22 And when he had said this, he breathed on them, and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. 20.23 If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained." 20.24 Now Thomas, one of the twelve, called the Twin, was not with them when Jesus came. 20.25 So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see in his hands the print of the nails, and place my finger in the mark of the nails, and place my hand in his side, I will not believe."

Jesus Appears to the Disciples again

20.26 Eight days later, his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. The doors were shut, but Jesus came and stood among them, and said, "Peace be with you." 20.27 Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here, and see my hands; and put out your hand, and place it in my side; do not be faithless, but believing." 20.28 Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" 20.29 Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe." 20.30 Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of the disciples, which are not written in this book; 20.31 but these are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing you may have life in his name.

Jesus Redivivus in Jerusalem

24.36 As they were saying this, Jesus himself stood among them. 24.37 But they were startled and frightened, and supposed that they saw a spirit. 24.38 And he said to them, "Why are you troubled, and why do questionings rise in your hearts? 24.39 See my hands and my feet, that it is I myself; handle me, and see; for a spirit has not flesh and bones as you see that I have." 24.40 24.41 And while they still disbelieved for joy, and wondered, he said to them, "Have you anything here to eat?" 24.42 They gave him a piece of broiled fish, 24.43 and he took it and ate before them. 24.44 Then he said to them, "These are my words which I spoke to you, while I was still with you, that everything written about me in the law of Moses and the prophets and the psalms must be fulfilled." 24.45 Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, 24.46 and said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Christ should suffer and on the third day rise from the dead, 24.47 and that repentance and forgiveness of sins should be preached in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. 24.48 You are witnesses of these things. 24.49 And behold, I send the promise of my Father upon you; but stay in the city, until you are clothed with power from on high."

The Ascension

24.50 Then he led them out as far as Bethany, and lifting up his hands he blessed them. 24.51 While he blessed them, he parted from them, and was carried up into heaven. 24.52 And they returned to Jerusalem with great joy, 24.53 and were continually in the temple blessing God.

The Appendix to John's Gospel

21.1 After this Jesus revealed himself again to the disciples by the Sea of Tibe'ri-as; and he revealed himself in this way. 21.2 Simon Peter, Thomas called the Twin, Nathan'a-el of Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zeb'edee, and two others of his disciples were together. 21.3 Simon Peter said to them, "I am going fishing." They said to him, "We will go with you." They went out and got into the boat; but that night they caught nothing. 21.4 Just as day was breaking, Jesus stood on the beach; yet the disciples did not know that it was Jesus. 21.5 Jesus said to them, "Children, have you any fish?" They answered him, "No." 21.6 He said to them, "Cast the net on the right side of the boat, and you will find some." So they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in, for the quantity of fish. 21.7 That disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, "It is the Lord!" When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he put on his clothes, for he was stripped for work, and sprang into the sea. 21.8 But the other disciples came in the boat, dragging the net full of fish, for they were not far from the land, but about a hundred yards off. 21.9 When they got out on land, they saw a charcoal fire there, with fish lying on it, and bread. 21.10 Jesus said to them, "Bring some of the fish that you have just caught." 21.11 So Simon Peter went aboard and hauled the net ashore, full of large fish, a hundred and fifty-three of them; and although there were so many, the net was not torn. 21.12 Jesus said to them, "Come and have breakfast." Now none of the disciples dared ask him, "Who are you?" They knew it was the Lord. 21.13 Jesus came and took the bread and gave it to them, and so with the fish. 21.14 This was now the third time that Jesus was revealed to the disciples after he was raised from the dead.

JOHN

21.15 When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon, son of John, do you love me more than these?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." He said to him, "Feed my lambs." 21.16 A second time he said to him, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." He said to him, "Tend my sheep." 21.17 He said to him the third time, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" Peter was grieved because he said to him the third time, "Do you love me?" And he said to him, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep. 21.18 Truly, truly, I say to you, when you were young, you girded yourself and walked where you would; but when you are old, you will stretch out your hands, and another will gird you and carry you where you do not wish to go." 21.19 (This he said to show by what death he was to glorify God.) And after this he said to him, "Follow me."

21.20 Peter turned and saw following them the disciple whom Jesus loved, who had lain close to his breast at the supper and had said, "Lord, who is it that is going to betray you?" 21.21 When Peter saw him, he said to Jesus, "Lord, what about this man?" 21.22 Jesus said to him, "If it is my will that he remain until I come, what is that to you? Follow me!" 21.23 The saying spread abroad among the brethren that this disciple was not to die; yet Jesus did not say to him that he was not to die, but, "If it is my will that he remain until I come, what is that to you?" 21.24 This is the disciple who is bearing witness to these things, and who has written these things; and we know that his testimony is true. 21.25 But there are also many other things which Jesus did; were every one of them to be written, I suppose that the world itself could not contain the books that would be written.
