From the Rector: Are We Having Fun Yet?

What do you do for fun? I read mystery novels, work crossword puzzles, talk to friends on the phone, take walks, and sing. Evan watches baseball, football, and NASCAR on television, listens to country music, and plays intramurals with his frat brothers. We all have things we like to do that we identify as fun—stuff we do in the evenings or on the weekends, whenever we have a minute to relax.

Then there are the long periods of fun we refer to as vacations. We get away from whatever we need to get away from and go someplace else to sightsee, lie on the beach, backpack, or whatever else we enjoy doing that we don't do on a regular basis. I usually don't go away unless it is to see family because I don't enjoy vacationing alone. Instead, I make play dates with friends to go to museums, movies, or lunch. I may visit one of my siblings or take a trip with a friend.

Having Spiritual Fun

Leisure pursuits and vacation activities are what we think of most often when we talk about having fun, but I want to talk about another kind of fun—a deeper kind of fun. Sometimes we call it joy, but I'd like to call it spiritual fun. The New Testament reading in recent days has been from Acts, which is filled with stories about the apostles and their mission to bring the good news to the world. Some days good things happen to them, and some days they end up in jail. Paul was released from prison by an angel, but James the brother of John, was killed. It was not an easy life, being an apostle, but I realized as I read that they were having fun!

They were spreading the gospel willingly and joyfully because they wanted to. They loved the preaching, they loved the teaching, and they loved it when people's eyes lit up when they were baptized in the Holy Spirit. The apostles were in danger all the time. Yet they were having fun because they were following their call from God. They were doing what they were passionate about—spreading the good news of God's love in Jesus Christ.

Are we—you and I—having fun yet? Is your job fun for you? Are you passionate about it? Are you getting a kick out of it? I wake up every Sunday morning feeling just a little different than I do other days of the week. When I was first ordained, I thought the little flutter was nervous energy about being on time, or performance anxiety about whether the sermon was any good, or even worry about making a mistake in the liturgy as I did one morning when we ended up saying "The Nine Commandments."

But I've been ordained seven years now and that "little flutter" is still there. I've discovered it is excitement. I love Sunday mornings. I love preaching, I love celebrating, I love people. I have great fun on Sunday mornings!

Living Passionately

Fun in this sense also means satisfying. I also am deeply satisfied by my pastoral counseling work. If someone is in trouble and needs help, the work is not fun in the sense of good times or kicking back. Being available to God on another's behalf is challenging work, and a great privilege. It is fun in the deeper sense of knowing that this is what God has called me to do; doing this work is my heart's desire.

God wants us to enjoy life, to live passionately and fully. When we are miserable, God is miserable with us. What in your life do you enjoy? Anything? Everything? Nothing? Deep fulfillment is God's gift to us when we respond to God's call, and God can give us opportunities for fulfillment that life circumstances might not present.

As you go through this next month, think about what you are doing that satisfies you and what you are doing that does not satisfy you. Change what you can and ask God for help with what you cannot. If there is something that you want to do, but are scared to try, ask God for help there too. So the next time God whispers to you in your prayer, "Are we having fun yet?", we can say yes with grateful hearts.

This book is pure joy.

Gospel Lessons for October

October 1, Mark 9:38–43, 45, 47–48, The 17th Sunday After Pentecost

In the Gospel Jesus bids his disciples to accept all who seek to do good in his name and to deal ruthlessly with whatever part of themselves causes sin. Early Christians were doubtless faced with people outside their communities who claimed they were acting in Christ's name. The tolerant answer given here suggests that Jesus' followers must avoid arrogance and be open to God acting as God wills. On the other hand, it is a serious matter to lead a believer astray. The counsel to destroy offending parts of the body is exaggerated to make clear the importance of avoiding various sins. The description of hell is drawn from the garbage dump outside Jerusalem.

October 8, Mark 19:2–9, The 18th Sunday After Pentecost

In the Gospel Jesus is asked about divorce, and he reaches back to the creation story to set before his hearers the ideal of the marriage relationship. In Jesus' lifetime there were more views held about divorce, some strict, some more lenient. In one sense, Jesus is the most strict of all: what through natural union God has made one cannot be separated by human action. Yet, in another sense, Jesus' answer refuses to deal with the question in the way it is asked. Instead he honors the solemnity and purpose of marriage. The motivation for Jesus' works may have been his concern with men who set aside their wives and, in that society, left them poor and insecure.

October 15, Mark 8:27–38, The 19th Sunday After Pentecost

In the Gospel Jesus counsels a would-be disciple to give all to the poor and follow him. He then teaches his disciples how hard it is for those with riches to enter the kingdom. Jesus first refuses to let himself be called *good*, since that description belongs to God alone. He then finds that the man has tried to live out his duties toward his neighbor in response to divine love. But the decision for discipleship must go beyond this. If the heart is divided by desires for worldly security, there is no way one can enter into the kingdom's loving justice. Yet by the power of God, people can be converted and saved.

October 22, Mark 10:35–45, The 20th Sunday After Pentecost

In the Gospel story, Jesus' followers still expect that his way will quickly lead to a state of glory in which the want special places. Jesus tells them of a different path of discipleship. First Jesus and then his disciples must experience the cup of sorrow and the baptism of death. They are not to live and act like worldly rulers. They must lead in servanthood. Their example is Jesus, who as the Son of Man serves and gives his life.

October 29, Mark 10:46–52, The 21st Sunday After Pentecost

Our Gospel is the story of the new vision of blind Bartimaeus. The evangelist has carefully prepared for this story by illustrating the inability of the religious officials to perceive who Jesus is and by describing the shortsightedness of the disciples. Now, with nothing but his great hope, this blind beggar calls out to Jesus. He uses the only title of honor he can think of—Son of David, dangerous words in the present political climate. But Jesus stops on how own profound journey, and Bartimaeus if healed through his faith. Then, as a model of a disciple who has received healing as a gift, he follows Jesus on the way to suffering and death before glory.
