#### From the Rector: Balance and Boundaries

Wisdom was one of the topics we discussed in our adult education class on Christian virtues. We talked about some of Jesus' references to wisdom, such as the parable of the wise and foolish bridesmaids. But one of Jesus' most intriguing references to wisdom occurs when he commissions the disciples to go out and proclaim the gospel. He sends the disciples out two-by-two telling them to be as wise as serpents and innocent as doves. (The serpent was a symbol of wisdom in many religions of the time, a class member told us, which is probably why Jesus chose it—he clearly does not associate it with evil of any kind.)

Jesus sends his disciples out as sheep among wolves—as followers of Christ focused on seeking God's kingdom into a world that seeks security in material goods or social power. If they are not both wise and innocent—wise in the ways of the world, but innocent of participating in them—they will be taken advantage of or dilute the radical nature of their spiritual message. Innocence without wisdom or wisdom without innocence would get them off track.

Our discussion of wisdom brought to mind something I've been working on—balance and boundaries. To be an effective disciple and proclaim the good news about God in Christ both are necessary. A radio commercial about home insurance says, "Sometimes life comes at you fast." That's an understatement! Most of the time, life comes at us pretty fast. And it's hard to react both wisely and innocently in accordance with God's will if we do not have an innate sense of balance and reasonably secure boundaries.

Balance is about knowing ourselves well. It is important to know our own needs and passions, our strengths and weaknesses, our gifts and limitations. We need to have some idea of our optimum balance of work and rest, creativity and receptivity, listening and talking, quiet time and social time. For example, though I am an extrovert, I know that I need a certain amount of quiet time and alone time. I also know that I would be really uncomfortable at a two-day silent retreat, so I choose other kinds. I have learned that the most fulfilling parts of my ministry demand the most energy. I have learned that just because something is fun does not mean it is play. If I don't rest—physically and emotionally—after I have expended emotional or mental energy, I will not be able to give of myself as effectively, because I will become tense and irritable.

I've had to learn to ask God for help with a very damaging habit—saying to myself, "I shouldn't be this tired after doing this or that thing." Or, "I don't want to go to this social event because I'm tired, but if it don't, there won't be another one when I need it." I have

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discovered that negative self-judgment does not help me to achieve balance. Nor does it help me to grow.

Jesus tells his disciples to stay in towns that welcome them. If they are not welcomed, they should just shake the dust off their feet and move on. To succeed in their mission, they needed to reach receptive people and not waste time with those not ready to receive the gospel. This word to the disciples is about boundaries—where we stop and others begin. Jesus wants the disciples to proclaim the gospel in its pure, unadulterated form. Jesus does not want converts at any cost; he wants to give the message to those who can receive it. Jesus wants to make sure the disciples understand that it is not their responsibility to wrestle people to the ground to get them to believe. Their responsibility—and their boundary—extends only to proclaiming the gospel. If the gospel is not received, then they must move on.

At some times in my life, I have been a chameleon, changing or ignoring parts of myself to make other people happy. God did not create us to be other than who we are. If we try to squish ourselves into places where we don't fit, we will be miserable.

I have also experienced the frantic anxiety of trying to take responsibility for others' reactions. If someone else is angry or sad or upset, it must be my fault. Or, I think that I am responsible for fixing this or that situation. It's not true. We can't change or fix anyone but ourselves. And we can fix ourselves only with God's help.

Jesus sent the first disciples out with balance and boundaries. He sends us out with the same things. We are to be wise in the ways of the world but not "of the world." We are to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ as it was given to us and leave the outcome to God. Balance and boundaries are essential for being faithful and loving servants of our Lord Jesus Christ, and we can all use more wisdom in this area. A good thing to pray for as we enter the "ordinary time" of the church year, when we focus on living out the gospel in our daily lives.

#### **Speaker Series a Success**

This program year, St. John's began a new venture—a speaker series designed to attract people from the community. This year we had four speakers—two in the fall and two in spring—who covered Muslim-Christian relations, preparing wills and other end-of-life documents, global warming, and dealing with mental illness. Bill Schenck coordinated the first speaker on end-of-life issues, and Faye and Bill Pritchard handled the other three. The biggest attendance was for the Muslim imam from the All-Dulles Area Muslim Center, but interest in all the subjects was very high.

Our series will take a break for the summer and begin with a speaker on immigration issues in September. Thanks to Faye, Bill Pritchard, and Bill Schenck for their efforts to get this new project underway.

# **Children's Programs Focus on Service and Story**

During the school year, St. John's program for children includes a 9:00 a.m. Sunday School hour plus a Children's Chapel during the first part of the 10:00 service. This year, the 9:00 class focused on a variety of projects, including selling fair trade coffee and other products one Sunday a month during coffee hour. The class also built a beautiful mosaic cross for the Children's Chapel upstairs and an aumbry for the church. (An aumbry is a container for the reserve sacrament, which is bread and wine that have already been consecrated). They sang and performed in church and learned about many of the church

seasons, including sitting down for a children's Passover meal.

Children's Chapel at 10:00 focused on the liturgy for the day. The children participated in a youth version of the Liturgy of the Word and reflected on the story or theme for the day.

The 9:00 a.m. Sunday School hour ended on May 20, Children's Chapel on June 17. Both will begin again on Sunday, September 9. Thank you to our teachers—Leslie Mead, Diane Henderson, Carrie Harbin, and Del Hunt—our schedule coordinator, Beth Fowler, and our carpentry expert, Bryan Harbin. We also thank our Children's Chapel leader, Norka Antelo, a member of Iglesia Cristo Rey, for her service to the children of St. John's.

### **Gospel Lessons for July and August**

## July 1, Luke 9:51–62, Fifth Sunday After Pentecost

In our Gospel we hear how Jesus on this way to Jerusalem encounters opposition and misunderstanding, and then speaks with several would-be disciples. The Samaritans reject Jesus because they were opposed to worship in Jerusalem. James and John wish to punish them, but this is not Jesus' way. Potential followers are bid to count the cost, and Jesus points out that true discipleship means leaving other things behind. This can cause the painful rupture or past ties and relationships.

## July 8, Luke 10:1–12, 16–20, Sixth Sunday After Pentecost

In the Gospel story, Jesus appoints seventy missionaries to go before him and gives them their instructions. The number recalls the leaders who were once chosen to assist Moses in his work and signifies the nations of the world. The narrative is meant to prefigure the evangelization of every land. The ministry of proclamation and of healing is a matter of urgency and brings judgment on all who fail to receive its messengers. The disciples are representatives of Jesus in a battle with the powers of evil.

## July 15, Luke 10:25-37, Seventh Sunday After Pentecost

This Gospel is the lawyer's question and the parable of the Good Samaritan. While testing Jesus, this expert in the law asks a question at the heart of human longing: how can life's true meaning and purpose be realized? Jesus causes him to answer for himself with the summary of the law. Recognizing how hard it is to put such lofty commandments into practice, the lawyer next asks, who is the neighbor that I am to love? Jesus hears his real question (who is *not* my neighbor?) and tells him the story of a man who could help another without requiring the law's definition.

## July 22, Luke 10:38–42, Eighth Sunday After Pentecost

The Gospel is the story of Martha and Mary and their different attitudes toward life and the Lord's presence. Jesus is on his way to Jerusalem and his

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death. The little narrative focuses on Martha and indicates how good works without a response to the Lord may only lead to anxiety and missing what is essential.

## July 29, Luke 11:1–13, Ninth Sunday After Pentecost

In the Gospel lesson Jesus teaches his disciples about prayer and the character of God as Father. This shorter version of the Lord's Prayer is the earliest known to us. Its concern is both with present life and with readiness for the coming of the reign of God. Jesus' two little stories encourage his followers continually to ask in prayer and to expect the good gifts of God, especially the Holy Spirit.

## August 5, Luke 12:13–21, Tenth Sunday After Pentecost

In our Gospel Jesus warns against greed and tells the story of an individual who was rich only in material possessions. The Lord refuses to be the judge in a matter having to do with the inheritance and wealth. Life lived without reference to God is empty and foolish. Despite all our plans and efforts at security, the fact of death makes this very clear.

# August 12, Luke 12:32–40, Eleventh Sunday After Pentecost

In the Gospel Jesus teaches his disciples to trust entirely in the reign of God, their Father, and to be ever ready for the coming of the Son of Man. The kingdom is God's gift. Disciples are to respond by letting go their hold on worldly possessions and giving their heart to a treasure that is heavenly. They are to remember the householder who would have kept his house safe if he knew when the thief was coming. They are to be like servants alert for the return of their master whenever he comes. Like the Lord of the Eucharist, he will then wait on them.

## August 19, Luke 12: 49–56, Twelfth Sunday After Pentecost

In our Gospel Jesus foresees difficult times ahead: his own ordeal and the necessity of division even within families. He has come to bring the purifying fire of judgment, and must himself first undergo the baptism of suffering and death. Before there is any peace on earth, hard decisions leading to ruptures have to be made. The people should be like good weatherwatchers in reading the sings of the times.

# August 26, Luke 13:22–30, Thirteenth Sunday After Pentecost

In our Gospel Jesus teaches of the narrow door to salvation. Mere association with him will not be enough to assure a place in the kingdom. The little story of the householder who has locked his door also suggests that the opportunity of the reign of God is not available indefinitely. Now is the time for decision. Yet, while many who might expect a seat in the kingdom will be rejected, others will come from the four corners of the earth to sit at the banquet.
