From the Rector: Floating Along with God

The adult education class is working with a book by the Rev. John Westerhoff, who talks about our relationship with God as a cooperative one. We cooperate best with God—and things work out best for us, though we can't always tell right away—if we turn our wills and lives over to God and let God tell us what God's will is for us and help us to accomplish it.

Westerhoff uses the metaphor "floating" for cooperating with God in this way. People who fall out of boats either panic and sink, or they try to swim to shore. Either way, they die! Those who panic don't think they have the ability to help themselves, and the swimmers aren't strong enough to make it on their own. But there is a third way—floating. Floating is cooperating with the water, rather than fighting against it or being paralyzed by hysterical fear.

Clearly, there are limits to this metaphor: we could be floating toward Niagara Falls! But floating is still a good image for cooperating with God if God is the water. Floating along spiritually is not an easy thing to do. It means leaving God to determine what we do and how and when we do it. It means trusting that God will grow us into our best selves.

Someone recently told me that the hardest part of recovery from an illness is not when we are feeling really sick and it is clear we need to rest all the time, nor when we are nearly well and can do almost everything we could do before. It is the middle time, the time when we start to feel well enough to do something, but not well enough to push too hard. Doing something feels so good that we try to do too much. Somehow, resting at this stage can make us feel like weaklings.

I am in the middle stages of healing, and that is certainly true for me. I can do a lot of what I normally do—for a day or so. Then I need to rest, but I don't give in to the need. That's when I crumble into little pieces and have to go to bed. I hurt physically, and I hurt emotionally because I beat myself up for not being stronger. I hurt because I compare myself to other people and the kind of recovery they had. I am upset because I expected to be better than I am at this point along the way. Sometimes I panic and wonder if I am ever going to be all better.

In this middle stage of healing, I can exhibit both of the behaviors named by Westerhoff: panic and trying to swim. These behaviors keep me from listening to my body and my emotions. They also keep me from listening to what God is asking me to do.

Of course, floating along with God applies to much more than healing from an illness. God wants our cooperation all the time so we can be Christ's body on earth. We need to practice humility. Humility is about knowing who we are. Knowing who we are includes accepting that we are God's beloved children and that we are fully dependent on God to meet our needs. We need to practice trust. We need to act in faith that God will be with us—no matter where we find ourselves on our journey—with love and grace and healing power.

In October: Socially Responsible Investing

The Rev. Ed Miller will discuss "Socially Responsible Investing" on Monday, Oct. 22, at 7:30 in the church undercroft. What is "Socially Responsible Investing"? It isn't the form used to write a thank you note to your broker. It's a broad term to cover issues relating to how you invest your money. Should you own stocks in companies that pollute, for example. What about the stocks in a mutual fund?

St. John's members have a special interest in the Sudan because of David Bako—the Sudanese priest who spent time with us. Does it help or hurt David's life if we invest in companies doing business in the Sudan?

The Rev. Miller serves on a national Episcopal committee on this topic. He will not give you advice on investing in specific stocks or mutual funds, but he will address issues related to socially responsible investing. And you don't have to own stocks or bonds to find this issue of interest.

Last Month: Immigration

Our Speaker Series got off to a great start this fall with a presentation by Francisco Concepcion, an attorney who specializes in immigration law. He talked with a very interested crowd about how immigration laws work and what we can do as Christians to help people who are working through these difficult issues.

Gospel Lessons for October—Year C

October 7, Luke 17:5–10, Nineteenth Sunday After Pentecost

Jesus tells his disciples of faith's great power and reminds them that servants must not expect special privileges or thanks merely for doing their duty. The first saying forcefully stresses the realization that faith's strength—even the power of a little faith—should never be underestimated. The story about the hardworking servant and the master makes the point that humans can never hold any claim over God and put God in their debt. For Jesus' followers there is no room for boasting or self-righteousness because of their faith and service.

October 14, Luke 17:11–19, Twentieth Sunday After Pentecost

Jesus' command brings about the cleansing of ten lepers, but only one, a Samaritan, returns to give thanks. Jesus is on the way to his destiny in Jerusalem. The narrative illustrates the power of the reign of God to give a new lease on life. The lepers, who were formerly outcasts, would now be allowed to return home. But only a despised Samaritan recognizes that a life of gratitude and faith is now possible. Physical healing is but a first step; the Samaritan also becomes whole and finds salvation.

October 21, Luke 18:1–8a, Twenty First Sunday After Pentecost

Jesus tells a comic parable about a judge who is so pestered by a woman that he finally gives in to her pleas. The evangelist tells the story in order to commend persistent prayer. It would be particularly appropriate at a time when people were losing heart. Another focus of the parable is on the corrupt and impious judge. If even a man such as this will finally render justice, how much more will God hear those who call on God.

October 28, Luke 18:9–14, Twenty Second Sunday After Pentecost

This is the story of the sinful tax collector and the Pharisee who trusts in his own righteousness. The parable illustrates repeated themes of the Gospels: God's ways frequently reverse human expectations. If is God's acceptance—and not human merit—that opens the gift.
