### From the Rector: Good Job, God!

Thank you, God, for creating me! — St. Clare of Assisi

I have some lovely crocuses in my front yard—about ten of them, all pressed up together and wide open, like a choir singing their hearts out. Good job, God!

Sometimes I get a chance to watch the sunrise outside my kitchen window after I have finished my bike ride. I'm amazed by the aquas and oranges and blush reds that streak the sky with color. Good job, God!

In this season of Easter, we remember God's best job of all—sending Jesus to be God-withus, to teach us, live with us, love us, and, ultimately, to die for us. God resurrected Jesus from the dead so that we, too, might be eternally with God. Surely God's best work ever!

My spiritual director says that one way of reminding ourselves of God's constant presence with us, around us, and in us is to notice God's handiwork and express our gratitude for it. The beauty of nature is one of the most obvious expressions of God's handiwork, but there are many others—signs of life and love in our world, even in the midst of darkness.

I often sense God's presence during the workday as I pray for guidance and direction each morning. If I take a deep breath and listen, I get exactly what I need to do my job that day, and it does not require any more energy than I have. Thanks, God!

No matter what size the church, clergy are always concerned about getting volunteers. When I ask for a volunteer and get a response, I am always grateful. When projects that seem totally chaotic fall into place, I am grateful. Sometimes I don't know that the community needs something, Yet, somehow, the need is met—with time, talent, or treasure. When I realize that a need was unknown—and yet fulfilled— my heart overflows with gratitude.

In any job, the work, the day—everything—goes better if you invite God into your day. Notice when God is there, even if you were too busy or too distracted to issue God an invitation.

Notice God's love and care in your relationships. I have wonderful neighbors who have been putting my trash out for months. They moved in with me the week I had surgery and have been absolutely wonderful about changing a light bulb if I need it and caring in so many ways. My brother and sister-in-law brought me a new sofa I can sit in. A great mechanic keeps my old car together until I can find the energy to get a new one. Thanks for caring people, God!

Just when I needed a place to stay, I had a surprise offer to stay with someone during my vacation in Atlanta. I don't have to do it all myself. God is looking out for me.

Not only does God send people to help me, God gives me the joy of helping others. What a great blessing, to give my gifts in a way that makes others smile. How wonderful it is when sharing my experience is a blessing to another. Yesterday someone sent me a reading because she was reminded of it by something I said. I had seen it many times, yet I needed to see it again, and God sent it. Our relationships are truly God's gifts to us, and we are God's gifts to others.

Sometimes we forget to notice the wonder of one of God's greatest gifts to us—ourselves. We are so caught up in what we cannot, should not, or did not do, that we forget we have talents, skills, and abilities that God has given us to help God bring in God's kingdom. In God's scheme of things, each of us is infinitely valuable—so valuable that even if only one of us had needed salvation, God would have sent Jesus rather than let go of that one person. We are the lost sheep and the lost coin in the parables. We are valuable because we exist. We exist because God created us.

As she was dying, St. Clare of Assisi exclaimed, "Thank you, God, for creating me!" Remember to thank God every day for the gift of life.

During the Easter season we celebrate new life—from purple crocuses to Jesus' resurrection from the dead. God is always inviting us to notice the new life God is constantly creating in the world, in us, and in our relationships with others. May you have a joyful Eastertide as you look for and celebrate the gift of new life!

## My Mission Trip to Standing Rock Sioux Reservation

I will be spending the summer in North Dakota at Standing Rock Sioux Reservation, home to the Lakota and Dakota peoples. I had often heard that Indian reservations are among the poorest places in our country, but I had no idea how bad it is. The unemployment rate at Standing Rock is about 70%, and 60% of the employed live below the poverty line. The life expectancy for men is about 47 years and for women, 58 years. About half the population is under the age of 20. There are epidemic levels of diabetes and near-epidemic levels of teen suicide and teen pregnancy. The alcoholism rate affects 100 percent of the population; everyone has a close relative who is an alcoholic.

Canon John Floberg, the Canon Missioner for the Episcopal Diocese of North Dakota, will be my supervisor. I will also work with other clergy in the area. The focus of my stay will be pastoral care and hospital visitations. There is a very active youth ministry during the summer, with various mission groups and youth camps. I will do some work with them to learn more about Christian education and youth ministry. I will also help liturgically in the neighboring churches by preaching and serving as a Lector and Lay Eucharistic Minister.

I believe that this summer at Standing Rock will be invaluable to me as a cross-cultural experience—and an opportunity to serve a community that is in great need.

### Our Youth Collect More than 600 Pounds of Food for AFAC

A few weeks ago, our youth loaded up two cars with food and delivered it to the Arlington Food Assistance Center (AFAC). The young people spent two months collecting food from parishioners— a total of 600 pounds! AFAC was extremely grateful because they were running short of food . Thanks to all of you who donated the food. Thanks to our young people and their teachers for developing the project.

### **CPR/AED Training**

You can receive training in how to perform cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and/or how to use an automated external defibrillator (AED). Bill Pritchard, safety officer and junior warden, is looking for folks interested in taking this training through the Red Cross so that St. John's will have people trained to deal with emergencies. # Speaker Series: The Role of the Church in the Public Square

On Monday, April 24, John Johnson IV from the Episcopal Church Office of Government Relations, will speak to us about "The Role of the Church in the Public Square," a timely topic in an election year. We also hope to have a speaker in May to address some aspects of developing spirituality in children.

### **Gospel Lessons for April**

### April 6, Third Sunday of Easter, Luke 24:13-35

Our Gospel is the story of how two disciples were met by a stranger on the road to Emmaus. That evening, as he breaks bread with them, they know the stranger to be Jesus. While they are walking together, Jesus interprets the scriptures to them, showing that it was necessary that Christ should suffer. Later he disappears from their sight. While their Lord is no longer physically present, the church now knows that Jesus will disclose himself in the breaking of bread, and sometimes through a stranger.

### April 13, Fourth Sunday of Easter, John 10:1–10

Our Gospel presents two related images in which Jesus is first the shepherd in charge of the sheep and then the gate through which the sheep enter. These teachings are set in the context of controversy. Jesus' words are directed against religious officials who do not know or truly care for their people. But Jesus knows his own sheep by name. They hear his voice and find the fullness of life.

### April 20, Fifth Sunday of Easter, John 14:1-14

In our Gospel passage Jesus speaks with his disciples shortly before his passion and tells them that he is the way, the truth and the life. He is the way because he himself is going the way of the sacrifice of his death, so to prepare a place for his disciples. In this way followers will discover that those who have seen him have seen the Father. All who come to the Father through Jesus will find true life.

### April 27, Sixth Sunday of Easter, John 14:15-21

In our Gospel, Jesus promises his followers that those who love him will be guided by the Holy Spirit and will also see him. The evangelist presents Jesus in final conversation with his followers. Soon he will be taken away from them by death, but God will send another Counselor. The world (that is, Godless society) cannot receive this Spirit of truth nor come to perceive Jesus as still living. Yet those who follow the commandments of love will find new life in intimate association with Jesus and the Father.
