From the Rector: Talking and Listening

A few weeks ago, we learned from Jesus that it is not what goes into the body that defiles, but what comes out of it. More recently in our Epistle, we learned from James that the tongue was one of the worst offenders when it came to defilement. It is a small member he says, but he compares it to a small fire that sets ablaze an entire forest. He called it a restless evil, full of deadly poison.

We have recently had a great example of what the tongue can do. A short video made by a few obscure people and posted on YouTube insults the prophet Muhammad and has set hundreds of people demonstrating against the United States in more than two dozen countries. Four people were killed in the Libyan embassy in Benghazi, and the embassy was destroyed. In Sanaa, Yemen, the U.S. embassy was overrun. "We cannot accept any insult to our prophet. It's a red line," said one protester.

President Obama said, "Make no mistake. Justice will be done." Secretary of State Hilary Rodham Clinton asked, "How could this happen in a country we helped liberate, in a city we helped save from destruction?"

It came from the iniquity of the tongue. From that small movie, the entire U.S. foreign policy in the region, focused on improving relations with Arab countries since the Arab Spring in 2011, has been severely strained. It does not matter that the United States government had nothing to do with the film. "We absolutely reject its content and its message," said Clinton, "but there is absolutely no call for violence as a response." The misuse of the tongue for prejudice and hatred incited huge misuse of the tongue in the Arab world for protest and violence.

There are other examples of the danger of the tongue. Gossiping about someone behind their back at work or at home can cast a shadow on that person's integrity that some people, including bosses and neighbors, may believe. People who are trustworthy may not be trusted because of false words spread about them and good reputations may be overturned. Bullying and cyber-bullying spread hurtful things and the victims of the bullying can become depressed, withdrawn, or violent. People who brag about themselves irritate and bore others, but even worse, spend their energy on themselves instead of those in need.

James says that not all things that come out of the mouth are evil. We worship and praise, we speak kindly to someone in need of help, we encourage a child in his or her adventures, we compliment people. But we do get the idea from James that the

tongue is something that must be watched carefully to make sure we do not let anything bad come from it.

James did not have anything bad to say about listening, however. It is often said that we have two ears and one mouth so we should listen twice as much as we talk. Americans have learned something living in a democracy that people in the Arab world, used to having all "truth" coming from the government, have not yet learned. Americans have learned to listen with skepticism to things that come out over the air waves. They have learned to listen for the source of the message and the particular bias the message contains before they believe something is true. When we listen, we avoid jumping to conclusions too quickly.

When we listen, we encourage people. Last week, a man came to the door and wanted someone to talk to. I listened for nearly an hour, making sympathetic noises but not saying a word. The man said he had no one to talk to at home and I got the feeling he needed to tell his story. I think my listening was encouraging to him in his difficult situation. Parents need to listen to their children to let them know they are valued, respected and loved. Spouses need to listen to each other so that both partners can express their ideas and values

When we listen, we learn things. Of course the obvious place we do that is in school, but we can learn about what is going on in the world from television news; we can learn about candidates' political positions by listening to their speeches. We can be alerted to danger by listening to weather reports.

We are spiritually fed when we listen. We touch God in nature, in a good piece of music, in a guided meditation. We listen to the Scriptures being read in church and the sermons that are preached.

When we listen, we are brought into relationship. By hearing about other people's lives, we grow into a more intimate relationship with them. Picking up the phone to find out how a friend is doing keeps us up to date with their lives. I have found I need to call Kristy and Evan more to find out about the

things they are doing every day instead of just hitting the highlights in an occasional call.

We must be discerning in our listening, however, because we can open our ears to talk that leads to evil thoughts and evil actions. And so we circle back around to the tongue again. We must watch what we say very carefully and ask God's help to use our tongues for good and not for evil, to help and not to harm. We do not want to start a forest fire with our tongues that will cause much damage. Let us all think before we speak and honor God by producing what James calls fresh water with our tongues.

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worship services and help adults learn about their faith through EFM and Sunday morning adult education. And as the ministries survey the vestry is conducting suggests, this is only a small part of the work of St. John's.

Given our deficit budget, I would ask you prayerfully to consider increasing your pledge for 2013 by looking at giving a larger percentage of your treasure back to the church in thanksgiving for the abundance we all have been blessed with. In the giving you will receive even more abundance.

Family Programs Projects

St. John's launched its re-energized Family Programs in September. We hosted our first Family Sunday on September 16. The kids went apple picking on Saturday, and we worked together Sunday to make apple crisp and sundaes for Fellowship after the 10 a.m. service. Everyone had a great time and the kids enjoyed the project. Every Family Sunday we will have a project that helps our kids learn to work in cooperation and love to put our teachings into practice. The older kids are learning patience with the younger kids and the younger kids are happy to learn under the guidance of their older role models.

Our next Family Sunday is October 21. We plan to go to a pumpkin patch on Saturday, October 20, in the morning to pick some fun pumpkins. On Sunday the kids will carve and decorate the pumpkins and roast pumpkin seeds for Fellowship. We will again have a sundae bar. Please let Beth Cavey know if your kids would like to participate. We welcome all to join us.

Another new exciting program begins in October. Would you like your child to learn about the Eucharist and celebrate a First Communion? St. John's is offering a four-week instruction that culminates in a First Communion Service. Classes will be held October 7, 14, 21, and 28 following the 10 a.m. service and will last approximately 30-45 minutes. The First Communion Service will be held on All Saints Day November 4 at the 10 a.m.

service. We are targeting first and second graders, but all are welcome, even if you have received communion previously. Our instruction aims to build on kids' innate understanding of holiness and teach them the specifics of the Eucharist.

Confirmation classes will begin November 4 and be held after the 10 a.m. service. We are targeting high school aged youth. Our program will be based on the "Confirm Not Conform" interactive lesson plan which encourages kids to ask the hard questions and really develop a personal understanding of their beliefs. Ten classes will be held over the course of the late fall and early winter. Candidates will be presented to St. John's in March and confirmed into the Episcopal Church by the Bishop during the annual visit.

As always, the second Sunday every month is when we assemble bagged lunches for the Bailey's Crossroads Homeless Shelter. First and Fourth Sundays are set aside for instruction and theological reflection. Everyone is always welcome to join us at 9:15 a.m. for all of our activities.

We are still looking for volunteers to help with Children and Youth programs. Talk to Beth Cavey and she can rattle off the opportunities for participation. Working with our dedicated kids is more rewarding than you can imagine.

Vestry Meeting Highlights August 2012 Vestry Meeting

The Challenge Grant was discussed. Ann Barker said that the donor indicated that the money could be used for various new programs. Ann said there were eight pledges to the Challenge Grant. She said that we had two donations for the general fund, one for the junior warden's unfunded projects, two pledge increases, and three for family programs, including Vacation Bible School.

St. John's has been awarded a Mustard Seed Grant of \$1,500 to help support our Family Programs initiatives.

The Vestry approved using a donation of \$1,500 to remove the stumps on Fifth Street and to plant new trees.

On the recommendation of John Wilson, the vestry will look into the installation of solar panels for the church.

The Vestry agreed to a joint Glencarlyn Civic Association/St. John's picnic on Saturday, September 22 on the church grounds. The following day, September 23, the 10 a.m. Eucharist will be held outdoors, also on the church grounds.

September 2012 Vestry Meeting

Bill Pritchard gave a presentation to the Vestry on a draft high-level Emergency and Continuity of Operations Plan he has developed for St. John's. Over the next few months he will work with Diane Henderson and Debbie Carter to develop the details for implementing the plan.

Bill also presented a basic outline for providing First Aid training at St. John's for both parishioners and residents of Glencarlyn. The first course will be offered Saturday, October 27, from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

Lenore Schmidt, the Junior Warden, reported that a painting day was being scheduled for September 29, starting at 9 a.m. A fall clean-up day is being scheduled for October 20. Lenore also reported that in October she will begin an inventory of the church's most valuable property, starting with the Altar Guild property in the Sacristy. The inventory is being taken for insurance purposes.

Faye Pritchard, the Senior Warden, reported that the St. John's Ministries Survey, which is intended to help the vestry understand how much time parishioners are devoting to church ministries and which they consider priority, would be distributed later in the week. Parishioners are to return the survey no later than October 7. Faye also reported that preparations for the Shrine Mont retreat October 12 through 14 are 90% completed and that there are sufficient funds in the Shrine Mont designated fund to cover anyone who needs financial help to attend the weekend.

Faye Pritchard, the Rev. Ann Barker, and Pete Olivere will continue working on updating our web site.

First Aid Course

St. John's Episcopal Church is offering a Standard First Aid, CPR, Automated External Defibrillator class on Saturday, October 27, from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. in the church undercroft. The four-hour class is being made available to parishioners and residents of Glencarlyn as part of a St. John's initiative to help its members and its neighborhood to prepare for emergencies in the home and community.

Cost of the class is \$35, which covers the cost of materials and equipment. The instruction itself is free. Class size is limited to a maximum of 10 students. Future classes will be held if there is sufficient demand. Students will receive manuals and, on successfully finishing the course, will be given wallet-sized cards noting they have completed the required knowledge and skills evaluation.

The class will be conducted by Bill Pritchard, who taught Red Cross First Aid, CPR, and AED courses for several years, and has conducted First Aid/CPR instruction for members of the Civil Air Patrol. Bill is a certified instructor of the Emergency Care and Safety Institute (ECSI).
