# From the Rector: Grow Up

In all but a few cases, the Sundays after Pentecost until the first Sunday in Advent are green Sundays - green vestments, green altar hangings, and often green outside in the world around us. Bishop Shannon says the way the church year is divided, half of the year is the story of Jesus' life and half of the year is the story of us, of how we become Christians in the face of Jesus' life, death and resurrection. The Sundays after Pentecost are Sundays in which we "grow up" into the Body of Christ.

After Pentecost we can grow in knowing and telling our own stories of our life in Christ. We can take Jesus into the world with us as we go about our daily lives. We can tell the story of how Jesus called us into his family and invite others to come into his family as well. We want to help people begin to identify the places where their stories touch our stories as neighbors and where they touch God's story of Jesus.

Since Pentecost marks the coming of the Holy Spirit into our lives, the weeks after Pentecost are a good time to grow in the power of the Spirit. Jesus is ready to clothe us with the power of the Spirit, says Brother Curtis Almquist of the Society of St. John the Evangelist (SSJE). "God is waiting for us to say yes with our own lives: our readiness or at least willingness to co-operate with God for what God has in mind for our own lives."

We can grow in gratitude. Meister Eckhardt said that if you only said one prayer in your life and it was "thank you" it would be enough. Practice noticing what is around you that you are grateful for. Be thankful for your body, its head and limbs and fingers and toes and all that they allow you to do. Be thankful for your senses that let you interact with God's world in an intimate way. Be thankful for the world around you and the marvels that it presents to each of us. Thank God for those you love and then thank them for being in your life. Thank God for your daily round of tasks, whether it includes a paying job or a non-paid path in life. Be thankful that they help structure your life and give it meaning and purpose. Be thankful that God has revealed Godself in Jesus Christ and that through him we have eternal life.

Develop your practice of hospitality. Summer is a great time for grilling out, going swimming with a group, visiting with people on vacation. Give hospitality generously to your guests and receive it graciously when you are the guest. Be open to extending yourself with warmth and love. Brother David Vyrhof (SSJE), says that "true Christian hospitality requires a giving of ourselves, an opening up of who we are, a willingness to stretch our sometimes narrow lives to step outside our comfort zone" to be with the world's poor and needy and even its enemies.

As you grow in hospitality, grow in service as well. Plant a row of vegetables for AFAC or take on some other service project to help the struggling in our community. Volunteer for one of the many walks and runs for various causes – or participate in them. Bake something for the new neighbors. Offer to take care of the lawn for new parents (someone cut our grass right after we had Evan and I was extremely appreciative). There are many ways to serve the community that are right under our noses if we just look for them.

Grow in awareness. Brother David Vyrhoff (SSJE) says "Jesus offers to lead us out of darkness and restore our sight. He offers us the chance to see

things as they really are". Seeing the reality of things leads us to the best way to relate to them, be they good or ill. When we see clearly, we can discern well and make good choices for our lives.

Summer is supposed to be a slower time (I know it is not for many of us), but working on our spiritual growth is never something we should be taking a break from. Learn your story and tell it as it relates to Jesus' story. Offer yourselves to others in hospitality and service. Be grateful for your many blessings. You will know greater joy and peace in the doing.

## **May Vestry Meeting Highlights**

Treasurer Bill Thomson presented a restructured format for the designated funds report, in which funds with a common purpose are grouped under a common heading. Most of the common headings correspond to a line item in the operating budget.

In response to an interest survey of parishioners, St. John's will be focusing on setting up an expanded partnership with AFAC. (This could include working at their building and packaging supplies at our church, at their building, or both.)

It was reported that Bill Schenck, Bill Thomson, and Ann Barker, who are working on improving worship at St. John's, will be looking into obtaining OneLicense for the parish. OneLicense would allow the parish to copy and use music from a variety of publishers.

The vestry authorized use of vestry discretionary funds to remove the tree closest to the church on the north side and replace it with a hardwood sapling.

The Junior Warden will start in June to seek bids for a permanent contract for sexton services.

The vestry authorized Paul Stenger to have an accessibility and mobility study done for the church. Paul has said he will pay for the study and he will also be purchasing a refrigerator for the second kitchen.

It was reported that Vacation Bible School,

which will run the week of July 15 at St. John's, is being co-sponsored with St. Paul's, Bailey's Crossroads.

# Words on Hymns

Our processional hymn for June 30 is "Fairest Lord Jesus." This much-loved hymn is also known as "Beautiful Savior" and "Crusader Hymn." The melody is thought to have originated as a folk song in Silesia, an historical region of Central Europe located mostly in Poland, with smaller parts in the Czech Republic and Germany. After Franz Liszt used the tune for a Crusaders' march in his oratorio *The Legend of St. Elizabeth* (1862), it also became known as "St. Elizabeth." In 1850, Richard Willis, composer of the music for "It Came Upon a Midnight Clear," arranged the folk song for use in church hymnals.

The melody and its German text were first printed together in 1842 under the name (translated) "Most beautiful Lord Jesus." There is less information about the origin of the English translation than there is for the German. Several

popular myths exist about the origins of the hymn. The best-known legend is that it was sung by twelfth-century German Crusaders as they made their long, weary way to the Holy Land. Another, more credible but less romantic account is that it was sung by the followers of John Hus, who were driven out of Bohemia in 1620 in the anti-Reformation purge and settled in Silesia. They had to keep their faith secret, yet had a strong tradition of hymn singing.

The text is listed as attributed to the German Jesuits, who first published it in their *Munster Gesangbuch* in 1677. The words date back at least 15 years earlier, having been found in a manuscript dating back to 1662.

## **Bulletin Boards**

St. John's is a dynamic community that needs more than just one bulletin board to keep its members up-to-date on activities. The St. John's board to the right of the kitchen displays pictures and news items of recent parish activities. It also includes ads and communiques from friends and alumni. The one beside it is devoted to news and pictures of parish youth activities.

The Opportunities board near the nursery is the focal point for community activities, from concerts to centering prayer workshops to activities for seniors. Announcements in the Sunday bulletin will frequently direct you there for more information on activities.

Two more bulletin boards near the piano are devoted to parish outreach opportunities. Here you will find information on many volunteer opportunities beyond our walls. One board highlights the church in the our community and local volunteer opportunities. The other focuses on the church in the world and volunteer agencies. For example this is where you will find the Arlington Interfaith Council newsletter along with pictures from the Heifer project.

All five bulletin boards are updated regularly. Be sure to check them frequently to keep up with everything that is going on!
