The Epistle

A Reading from the letter of James. 2:1-17

My brothers and sisters, do you with your acts of favoritism really believe in our glorious Lord Jesus Christ? For if a person with gold rings and in fine clothes comes into your assembly, and if a poor person in dirty clothes also comes in, and if you take notice of the one wearing the fine clothes and say, "Have a seat here, please," while to the one who is poor you say, "Stand there," or, "Sit at my feet," have you not made distinctions among yourselves, and become judges with evil thoughts? Listen, my beloved brothers and sisters. Has not God chosen the poor in the world to be rich in faith and to be heirs of the kingdom that he has promised to those who love him? But you have dishonored the poor. Is it not the rich who oppress you? Is it not they who drag you into court? Is it not they who blaspheme the excellent name that was invoked over you?

You do well if you really fulfill the royal law according to the scripture, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." But if you show partiality, you commit sin and are convicted by the law as transgressors. For whoever keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become accountable for all of it. For the one who said, "You shall not commit adultery," also said, "You shall not murder." Now if you do not commit adultery but if you murder, you have become a transgressor of the law. So speak and so act as those who

are to be judged by the law of liberty. For judgment will be without mercy to anyone who has shown no mercy; mercy triumphs over judgment.

What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, and one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill," and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead.

The Holy Gospel

The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to Mark. 7:24-37
Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus set out and went away to the region of Tyre. He entered a house and did not want anyone to know he was there. Yet he could not escape notice, but a woman whose little daughter had an unclean spirit immediately heard about him, and she came and bowed down at his feet. Now the woman was a Gentile, of Syrophoenician origin. She begged him to cast the demon out of her daughter. He said to her, "Let the children be fed first, for it is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." But she answered him, "Sir, even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs." Then he said to her, "For saying that, you may go—the demon has left your daughter." So she went home, found the child lying on the bed, and the demon gone.

Then he returned from the region of Tyre, and went by way of Sidon towards the Sea of Galilee, in the region of the Decapolis. They brought to him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they begged him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, and put his fingers into his ears, and he spat and touched his tongue. Then looking up to heaven, he sighed and said to him, "Ephphatha," that is, "Be opened." And immediately his ears were opened, his tongue was released, and he spoke plainly. Then Jesus ordered them to tell no one; but the more he ordered them, the more zealously they proclaimed it. They were astounded beyond measure, saying, "He has done everything well; he even makes the deaf to hear and the mute to speak."

Born Sept. 7, 1934 in New London, Connecticut
Lived in Danbury, New Milford, CT then moved to Terre Haute, IN where her father worked for the Federal Prison.

She graduated high school from Alderson, WVA in 1952 then entered the Marine Corp. She went for training at Parris Island, SC then was stationed at Henderson Hall in Arlington, VA where she worked in the photo lab. She met her husband while in the Marine Corp and left the Marine Corp as a Corporel after they were married.

They lived in an apartment off Columbia Pike which is now the site of the Arlington Mill Recreation Center, then Fairlington Villages before settling on S. First St in Glencarlyn. Kay stayed home with their four children: Joe, Rick, Tim and Diane. When Diane started school, Kay went back to work.

She worked at the Work Incentive Office (WIN) as the executive secretary to the VP. After WIN, she worked as an EA at American Management Systems in Rosslyn, then MICORP in Herndon and lastly Society for Human Resource Management in Alexandria, VA. After retiring, she worked for her GP (Dr Gibson) in Alexandria until she was almost 80.

In 2023, she moved to a retirement community in Midlothian, VA outside of Richmond.

She has 11 grandchildren: Gabbie and Tosha (Joe); Tony, Lenny. Rose (Rick); Timmy, Teddy, Sophia and Atticus (Tim); and Sarah and Holly (Diane).

Kay's third son, Tim was a member of St. John's Boy Scout Troop.

She has been an active member at St. John's for over 50 years. She has served on the Vestry several times. She was active at the annual bazaars; a volunteer in the office, and responsible for the Dr. Frank Todd memorial garden. Some of her greatest contributions were from her talents in skillfully decorating the parish hall for so many activities—dinner parties, Shrove Tuesday Pancake suppers, Easter events, spring and summer bazaars, bereavement luncheons, holiday parties to name a few. Her craft displays at the bazaars were renowned throughout the Region 3 and Glencarlyn communities.
